We are supplying our readers this week with the president's message in full. The big constables are not much ahead of us in this matter.

A perusal of the president's message will convince any intelligent man that is not already convinced, that Theodore Roosevelt is a man of brains and deliberation as well as a man of action.

A petition is being circulated this week among the business men of our city, to have the village board hire the mud and slush removed from the center of Main street, where it has been accumulating ever since the crushed rock was put on. There are also several crossings that must be raised, at least in the center, to prevent the mud and water from continually overflowing them.

There are a few people in every community that do not appreciate a good live, up-to-date newspaper, and, regardless of what a paper is and has been doing for the upbuilding of the city and surrounding country, one of the first things they do when they take one of their economic fits is to stop their local paper, thus saving an expense of about 12 1/2 cts. per month. We are glad they are so very scarce in this neighborhood.

The enterprising and progressive people of this city are beginning to wake up to the realization of the fact that the C. M. A. band is doing something for the city in pushing ahead and making of that organization a first-class band and one of which our little city might well be proud. What a difference between the attendance of the last band concert and that of the first, several months ago. Perhaps the gentle hints of this paper have not fell on deaf ears and we are entitled to some credit for the splendid patronage of the concert the proceeds of which amounted to \$69.00.

Corporations should be managed under public regulation and by national action. Our aim is not to do away with them. The capitalist who, alone or in conjunction with his fellows, performs some great industrial feat by which he wins money, is a welder, not a wrongdoer, provided only he works in proper and legitimate lines. We wish to favor such a man when he does well. We wish to supervise and control his actions only to prevent him from doing ill. 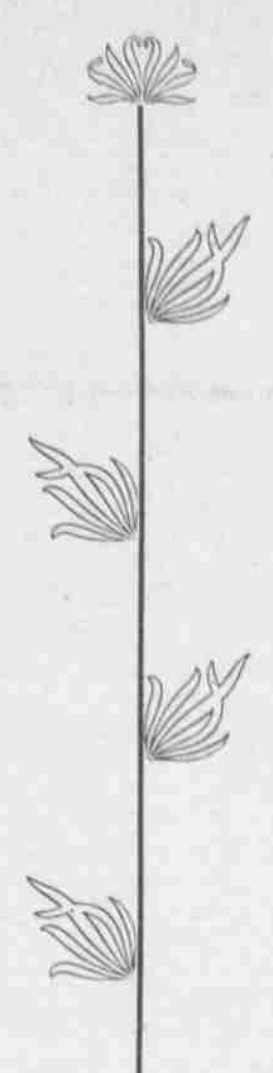
