A person accustomed to the cold weather and deep snows of the Central states at this season of the year can scarcely realize that it is now mid-winter and that people in our old state are shivering around campfires, coal fires and the beautiful snow is several feet deep on the level and still falling.

From the tone of the press and the opinions of representative people with whom we have talked it is fair to presume that among the likely candidates for U. S. senator, Hon. C. W. Fulton is the first choice of the republicans of Lane county. We also believe that he is the choice of the republicans of Oregon and that he will be our next U. S. senator.

The resignation of Ringer Herman, Commissioner of the General Land Office, at this time, comes as somewhat of a surprise, especially when we take into consideration the fact that he had some time yet to serve. However, his name has been freely mentioned by the newspapers in connection with the office of U. S. Senator, hence his resignation, just before the meeting of the state legislature, may have some significance.

Ashland Town Talk, one of the newest and brightest semi-weekly papers in Southern Oregon, changed hands last week, being purchased of its former proprietor Geo. C. Stanley, by S. L. Burton, formerly of the Enterprise of Evansville, Minn. Mr. Stanley expects to remain in Ashland and embark in other business unless he changes his mind. He is an enterprising newspaper man and a hustler and we regret to see him quit the business. However Mr. Burton, the new editor, comes well recommended and will doubtless give the people of that locality a splendid paper.

Last summer a special representative of the Mining and Engineering Review of San Francisco, tarried in the city long enough to prepare a nice descriptive article on Bohemia and secure a generous number of cash subscribers for that excellent paper. Since that time nothing regarding the Bohemia district has appeared in its columns to gladden the heart of the mine owner and prospector that has spent his time and money in the hills of old Bohemia. Last week, however, a short article appeared, giving its many readers some idea of the wonderful development of the camp during the past year and of its prospects for the future. The Review is a valuable mining paper and is read by thousands of mining men who know nothing of Bohemia and its wonderful prospects, hence an effort should be made to furnish it with a good reliable news and descriptive letter every month.

Time was when Mr. Geer was justly popular in this state and stood high in the councils of his party, but that was before his political pettiness of the last June campaign, when instead of putting his shoulder to the wheel as did his predecessor, ex-Governor Lord when he failed in getting the renomination, Mr. Geer petulently sulked in his tent, and even lent assistance to the opposing forces, if not directly, indirectly, by his inactivity and indifference. It will be remembered that it was Theodore Thurston Geer, who after agreeing to act in the capacity of chairman of the grand republican ratification meeting of state and county candidates near the close of the late campaign, betrayed his friends and political associates, and on the eve of the big ratification, under the pretext that urgent business required his attention at Roseburg, he deserted his friends and co-workers, unexpectedly put in his absence in this city and while in the Salem ratification was in evidence under the directions of a substitute chairman, Mr. Geer, sat in the office of the McClallen hotel, swamping yarns with a few of the hotel guests. Now this is the man who poses as the only logical senatorial candidate, and urges and feigns to expect his election to the United States senate by the republican members of the Oregon legislature at the coming session. He will be set down on good and hard. The people never have and never will sanction such perfidy as was displayed by Governor Geer during the late campaign.—Roseburg Plaindealer.
