ABOUT COTTAGE GROVE.

A Census Shows the Population of the Town to be 1402.

Le Roy.

Work is going steadily on and the ore is getting heavier and richer with each foot gained in the big tunnel. The forces are somewhat short on provisions and other supplies, but are living in hopes that the road will be opened up in a few days. A strike has recently been made which creates enthusiasm in the operators. In drifting on the main body of rich galena they have suddenly broke into a large body of Hemite ore which has the reputation of always being found in rich mines.

J. L. Le Roy, president of the Le Roy Mining Co., returned from a several weeks' trip, Wednesday morning. Mr. Le Roy reports the sale of stock most flattering and says that the prospects of stock sales and the condition of the mine were never brighter than now.

W. J. Wimer, the well known placer miner of Waldo, writes to the Grants Pass Courier relative to the statement made, that the miners there used to throw away the platinum caught with the gold in the sluice boxes because they did not know what it was as follows: "For 22 years we have been finding considerable quantities of platinum in our annual cleanings and that without making any special effort to catch it; and all of that time we knew that it was platinum. Until recent years there was no market for it. About 18 years ago we sent about nine ounces of it to San Francisco, never receiving a cent for it. They did not consider the matter of sufficient importance to report to us what they did with it. Twenty years ago the Smith gulch yielded nice lots of it, but as you say, we threw it away. We knew what it was, however."

Another important strike has been made by a prospector named Chandler on Beaver creek, a tributary of Umpqua creek. It is a 3-mile vein on south extension of Jacmetta, the property of C. Ollinger house. The ore is free milling and prospects so well that all who have seen it believe that Chandler has struck a big thing.—Glendale News.

Dr. Martin Damoneoff, one of the incorporators and stockholders of the company owning what is known as the Whale mine west of Ashland, has just returned to Portland from Alaska. To a press correspondent he tells the story of an island near Juneau where there is a mountain 4,500 feet high simply seamed with gold, both placer and quartz. Damourette will not give the location of the place and is endeavoring to keep it secret until he can return there in the spring. He brings specimens of the rock which are very rich.—Tidings.

The arrest of Peter Peterson, a miner and employee of the Columbia mine of Sumpter recently brings to light the most gigantic ore-theiving scheme in mining annals of the west. Peterson is charged with taking 150 pounds of ore from the Columbia mine which he sold in Sumpter for \$10 per pound. About forty pounds of this ore was recovered by officers making the arrest and is now in the possession of the sheriff of this county and is easily worth from \$50 to \$60 per pound. About three months ago the manager of the Columbia mine became suspicious of miners and he employed a detective who spent three months in the mine and discovered that there was an organized gang of thieves who had been at work for the past three years stealing ore from the Columbia, North Pole, Red Boy, Golconda, Bonanza, Paycheck and other mines. They sold ore at the uniform price of \$10 per pound, regardless of assay value. The ore taken is what is known as specimen ore, that is used by jewelers for ornamental purposes. It is estimated that ore taken from the Columbia mine alone is worth \$10,000 and the least estimate placed on specimens taken from all the mines is \$100,000. The specimens were sent all over the United States. At the present time there is 300 pounds known to be in Portland. There is also a lot in San Francisco. Warrants are out for six more men and the officers hope to capture several more within the next 24 hours.—Baker City, dispatch Jan. 30.

The future great mining districts of Oregon will be Blue River and Bohemia. They will soon themselves and the adjacent country because their richness will warrant it. There will be no inflation about it but the mines will speak for themselves if given a chance—Eugene Register.
