## Mining Notes.

J. S. Brund this week purchased the "Kentucky" mining claim from Sam Gettings, of this city. The Kentucky is located between the well known Crystal Consolidated Mining Co's property and the North Fairview Mining Co. Three year's assessment work has been done on the claim, and for the amount of work the showing is highly pleasing to Mr. Brund. He will do considerable work on the property this season, but will devote his attention more particularly to the Sweepstake property, of which he is the entire owner. The Sweepstake group consists of seven claims on Elephant mountain. Mr. Brund has a main tunnel on the Sweepstake of 1000 feet, 400 of which is on the main ledge and in a fine body of ore. From this main tunnel Mr. Brund states that he will be able to crosscut anyone of seven claims. He expects to commence active development work on this property as soon as he gets into the hills, which will not be later than the last of this week.

A dispatch from Baker City under date of March 12, states that the mining men of Eastern Oregon have decided to invoke the referendum against the Eddy bill, which was enacted by the last legislature. The law, which it is the purpose to repeal, imposes a tax on all corporations doing business in this state, in proportion to the amount of the capital stock. The mining men insist that it will retard the growth and the progress of the mining industry in this state. Petitions are now in course of preparation to be circulated for signatures. It will require over 4000 names in order to set the referendum machinery in motion, but the mining men insist that they can secure the necessary number of names and more, that they can repeal the law. This will be the first time in the history of the United States that the referendum has ever been invoked, although several states have adopted constitutional amendments providing for the initiative and referendum.

### SPRAYING BEGINS.

Our orchardists are now busy cleaning up their orchards, cutting sprouts and preparing to begin spraying. An observer representative while passing through the country adjacent to Grants Pass this week found many orchardists trimming up their trees and some in fact are already applying spray. All orchards should be given a spray at this time of year of a solution of salt, sulphur and lime.

This spray kills the San Jose scale and prevents fungus on the fruit. You may not have the scale or any fungus in your orchards but it is a good wash for the trees, and the fruit next season will be more perfect after using this spray. Here is the formula:

Unslacked lime.....50 lbs  
Power of sulphur.....50 lbs  
Common salt.....25 lbs

Slack the lime in enough water to do it thoroughly; add the sulphur and boil for an hour at least, adding water if necessary. Then add the salt and boil 15 minutes more. Add water to make 100 gallons, and spray hot through a coarse nozzle.

We all know the good effects of spraying for the codlin moth, and every orchardist who failed to spray thoroughly for this pest last year has resolved to do it right next season and save his fruit. If you fail to spray with salt, sulphur and lime while the trees are dormant you will be neglecting a most important part of your work. This spray should be applied to every tree in the orchard. If your trees have the scale it will kill it; if you have no scale, it will keep it out of your orchard. "Let us spray" if we wish to start right for a good crop in 1903.—Grants Pass Observer.

### CONGRESSIONAL CONVENTION

Eugene the Place Selected—Thursday April 9 at 2:30 p. m. Congressional Delegates Will Nominate a Congressman.

On March 12 the Republican Congressional Committee of the First Congressional District with Dr. T. W. Harris of Lane county chairman, met at Portland and fixed Thursday, April 9, as the date for holding the congressional convention and selected Eugene as the place for holding same. There will be a 3 per cent rebate given on all taxes paid in full previous to March 15th. In case a tax or the first one half is not paid before April 6th the law requires a 10 per cent penalty and 12 per cent interest to be added to such tax until paid.
