It is difficult at this time to see the outcome of the congressional contest. While many are of the opinion that Hon. Binger Hermann should not be returned to congress, setting up all sorts of reasons in defense of their assertion, among them that Mr. Hermann is a professional office seeker, etc., still at this time it looks to a "nigger up a tree," that Mr. Hermann is very much in evidence. Mr. Hermann may be a "professional office seeker" — but this is not against him. All politicians, at least many of them, are "professional office seekers". That is, they always try to remain in office, and as a rule the so-called "professional office seeker" makes the very best officer. It is his profession, and by his profession he lives. He takes a pride in it. If he did not make a good officer he would very soon find himself out of a job. Mr. Hermann may be a "professional" in this respect, and if so his friends can and will point to his record with pride, and demand that he be returned. He is the safest and most logical candidate at this time for the place made vacant by the untimely death of Hon. Thos. H. Tongue. It has been said that he is not in harmony with Senators Mitchell and Fulton. He may not have been at one time, but there is no reasonable excuse why they should not harmonize now. We would have a poor delegation, indeed, did it prove to be of so small a calibre that members could not get together on matters of great moment to the state bestowing such high honor upon them. We have faith in the broadness of Senators Mitchell and Fulton. They are the people's representatives. They will meet any man that the people of the State of Oregon may send to assist them in the work incumbent upon them, half way. Mr. Hermann if elected will meet them the other half. The people of Oregon today feel that Mr. Hermann is the proper man, and it is almost a certainty that he will receive the nomination.

The citizens of Lorone and farmers of that section are to be congratulated upon the enterprise they manifest in securing a telephone line from Cottage Grove to that place. Lorone and vicinity has always been rated as one of the best and most progressive communities in Lane county, and now the good people of that section have displayed their spirit of enterprise by taking up the matter of a telephone line from this city to Lorone. The Telephone Company could not see its way clear to extend to Lorone, but are furnishing some assistance in the matter. It is a desirable enterprise and should meet with success.

A copy of the Lane County Leader, under the proprietorship and editorship of W. C. Conner, reached the exchange table of the Nugget last Friday. Mr. Conner is a former Cottage Grove boy, the son of Ira Conner, one of the best men in Lane county, and in this instance the son is a chip from the old block. Under his management the Leader is greatly improved—in fact one would hardly suspicion it to be the same paper. It comes out with an attractive new head, good press work neat ads and a good local news service. It will certainly be appreciated by its patrons, and the Nugget extends the glad hand of welcome.
