HERMANN ELECTED.

The Voters of the First District Decide that Binger Hermann Shall Succeed Hon. Thos. H. Tongue. A Merited Honor.

MAJORITY ABOUT 2300.

Hon. Binger Hermann was elected to congress by a majority of about two thousand three hundred over A. E. Reames, of Jacksonville. Reames has carried four and possibly five of the seventeen counties of the district. There was an unusual falling off in the voting throughout the district. When the votes are all in it will show that about 35 per cent of the voters did not go to the polls at all. The total number of votes cast was about 30,000 as compared with 45,000 at the last election.
