Mines and Mining

Devoted to Bohemia News and Items of general interest to Mining Men.

Theodore Jennings is in from the Champion this week.

Messrs. D. Hamilton and Alex. Sparr have gone to the hills for the summer. Coal miners at the Dark Lane Colliery, Mirfield, England, have been on strike for 112 weeks.

W. P. Ely, of Kelso, Wash., arrived in Cottage Grove this week and is now in Bohemia in the interest of his mining properties.

Rudolph and Herbert Ahne, of Hanson, were in the city this week. They report everything looking good in their section of the district.

Walter Cochran went into Bohemia on Wednesday morning over the O. & S. E. road. He will join the force at the Crystal Consolidated.

Herbert Leigh came down from Eugene and took passage on the O. & S. E. Tuesday morning for Bohemia. He will look after the Noonday affairs and also visit the North Fairview property.

Mr. Reagan returned to Bohemia on Wednesday morning. He will probably do considerable contract work on the Mayflower and Golden slipper groups this summer.

E. S. Holderman, foreman on the new road from the Warehouse up Champion canyon, arrived in town Wednesday, looking for men to go to work. Mr. Holderman is desirous of securing fifty more.

Frank Williams, after a few days lay off in town, returned to Bohemia on Wednesday morning. Frank has some very fine claims in that camp and he intends doing much development work on them this summer.

D. J. E. MacLennan came out from Bohemia on Wednesday. He has for some time been employed by the Oregon Securities Company. He goes on a visit to Vancouver, B. C., for a short time and will then return to Bohemia.

Ed Jenks came out from Bohemia Tuesday evening on business and met with his mining properties. Ed is extensively interested in several parts of the district. He has just made a horseback tour over much of the camp and finds the outlook indeed bright. He says the snow has entirely gone except in a few patches here and there where the drifts were deep.

John Graber went into Bohemia on Tuesday morning to look after his mining interests there. Since Johnny sold his interest in the Vesuvius last year, he has wanted a visit to his parents at the old home in Switzerland, but he couldn't long keep away from the haunts where the glittering metal peeps out from the over-lapping rocks.

John Curran, one of the owners of the Grizzly property, went into the camp last Saturday and returned Tuesday evening. Mr. Curran is more than pleased with the outlook at the Grizzly. He was prepared to find the property in good shape and is now more than ever impressed with the future outlook for the property. As soon as arrangements can be made extensive development work will go forward on the Grizzly.

Work is steadily being driven in the lower tunnel of the Mountain Lion claim of the Crystal Consolidated Company's property. This tunnel is now 600 feet and shows a good ledge of foot of oxidized ore of good value. Work is to be continued on this level for 1000 feet. A substantial wagon road is soon to be built from the property down the Fairview canyon to connect with the new road now nearly completed up the Champion canyon.

Jack James lit out for the Bohemia hills on Tuesday morning. He has accepted a position with the Crystal Consolidated Company and for the next few months will burn the head of a drill on the Mountain Lion claim. Jack is a thorough miner, a good companion and on all round good fellow, and wherever he works he makes the interest of his employers his own, therefore he is always in demand when he wants to go on shift.

DIVIDE ITEMS.

The baseball players here have organized a first and second nine and intend to practice all of their spare time. They will probably meet the Lorane nine here next Sunday and see which nine can play the best.

Reuben Tucker, George Tramel, Albert Mackey and Richard Tapp attended a dance at the home of Joe Willetts on Silk creek Saturday night. They report a very enjoyable time.

Mr. Bucket has finished his new barn, thus improving the looks and increasing the value of his farm.

Miss Floy Lee visited Mr. and Mrs. Will McCoy of Siuslaw creek, the last of the week.

School closes a week from next Friday, after having a good term under the direction of our able teacher, L. M. Tucker.

Mr. Huff and family, of Cottage Grove, have moved here for a short time, while hauling wood on a contract.

Last Sunday another carload of machinery was abstracted at the Southern Pacific depot here to be forwarded over the Oregon and Southwestern road to the end of construction and then hauled into Bohemia district. This machinery is from the Leyner works at Denver, Colorado, and consists of three air compressors and complete drill plants which are to be used on the property of the Oregon Securities Company. One of these fine plants is to be installed at the Masdek, one at the Champion and one at the Helena No. 1. The motive power will be electricity brought from the big 500-horse power plant now in course of construction on Frank Brass creek just below the confluence of that stream with the waters of Champion creek. This is only a forerunner of the machinery that the Oregon Securities Company intends to install on its fine holdings in Bohemia. These drills will do away with much of the slow hand work and make rapid progress in deep development.

Frank Hughes left for Bohemia on Monday morning. He has accepted the position of mining superintendent of the Star Consolidated on Martin creek. For a few days he will put things in shape for the reception of a force of men. Much development work will be done on that property this summer and a good substantial wagon road will be built down the canyon about four miles to meet the stage road. A 10-stamp mill has been contracted for and is now being built in Chicago for installation on the Star property, but it has now been decided not to put it up until next spring and in the mean time to prosecute development and get everything in shape so that the best results will follow when the new mill is installed. From the best information obtainable the Star Consolidated will make a record on the right side of the ledger when the proper time comes.

Mr. Trystat, who has been handling the Leyner drill for several months at the Leyloy property came out from Bohemia this week and says that a crosscut is now being run from the main tunnel 650 feet in to tap the third parallel ledge on the north. This crosscut is now in 40 feet and has encountered many stringers of heavy galena and copper leading toward ore shales. It is expected to strike the third ledge in about 30 feet. All indications now point to the near encounter of a large body of ore. The drills and air plant on this property are working to the entire satisfaction of the management and the future looks bright for the Leyloy.

John Holland took the O. & S. E. route last Monday morning for his hold over job with the Oregon Securities Company on the new wagon road up the Champion canyon. John came down from Bohemia some ten days since feeling under the weather and had a sprained ankle. He intended to sooner return to the cooling shades of the canyon but found it very difficult to break away from his little granite "pete" to whom he is very much attached. That boy "pete" is a Jim dandy.

T. M. Doyle of Vancouver, who recently purchased the Joe Burnett property at the Red Bridge on Row river and placed Ben Pitcher in charge of it, has been back again to look over his purchases, and was so pleased with the outlook that he has now acquired possession of two other properties on Sharp's creek. He goes back to his home at Vancouver as a living, talking and walking advertisement for the abundant resources of this section. It is not unlikely that he will later on close out his holdings on the Columbia river and transfer his base of future activity to this point.

D. G. Gover is in from Bohemia this week. He has been running a 200 foot crosscut in the Riverbank in association with Albert Zinker, and reports a fine showing of ore. Mr. Gover says the entire Horsevane country is looking fine. The Mineral King owned by Albert Zinker is making a good showing. He also says the Minneapolis property, owned by Eugene parties is looking good. Mr. Gover is now engaged in running a crosscut on this property, and has already cut several splendid stringers and expects to cut a fine ledge in the next 40 feet.
