

Fresh Honey.—
 H. B. Elliott, living a few miles from this city, has developed into a bee man, and this year has secured from eleven stands of bees, 228 pounds of choice honey, 228 pounds of which he has sold at 15 cents per pound, netting him \$34.20, reserving the other 100 pounds for his own family. Mr. Elliott planted two and one-half acres to vetches, and with a spring blooming of a patch of white clover, the bees have subsisted on the vetches. After the bees had crapped the vetches to their satisfaction, Mr. Elliott took the patch in hand and harvested six tons of hay, two of which he sold on the ground at \$4 per ton, netting him \$8.00, and the other four tons, reserving for the hay, and the 228 pounds of honey at 15 cents, Mr. Elliott has made within a cash outlay of \$20, his estimation of the cost of the honey and hay crops, \$66.20 profit. Pretty good interest on a \$30 investment.

At The Bank Yard.—
 A timely appearance is to be witnessed at the Village & Grove brick yard, out of town. At present only six weeks' work they have over 200,000 brick made and a kiln of 10,000 burned. The gentlemen are employing sixteen hands and the weekly pay roll for the last six weeks has averaged \$100 per week, or \$900 for the six weeks. Messrs. Wallace have two machines ready to set up, one for pressed brick and the other for soft, and it is their intention to build shale and make other improvements between now and fall, that will enable them to make brick during the winter. This is strictly a home industry and of much value to the town. The quality of brick made by the Messrs. Wallace is not surpassed in this section of Oregon.

New Telephone To Bohemia.—
 The O. & S. E. Company and the Oregon Securities have decided to build a new telephone line to Bohemia. The building of this line is occasioned by the rapid increase in business of the two companies that have taken the matter up. The old line has been of much service, and was put in by subscription. The new line will be double with the central station at the Warehouse, and will be provided with facilities so that private conversations can be carried on. It is understood that the new company will purchase from the old company what material on hand and utilize it in the construction of the new line.

BASE CLAIMS.—
 Upon claims of the First National Bank of Roseburg for \$1750, Bank of Cottage Grove for \$175 and Michael Brothers, for \$300, papers were filed today by deputy U. S. Marshal J. A. Wilson, of Portland, against H. H. Brown, editor of the Plaindealer. This is a preliminary step toward collection of these claims and if not paid or proper answer made to complaint by September 15th, the debtors will be declared bankrupt. We understand that claims amounting to at least \$1500 more are pending but have not yet been filed.—Roseburg News.

KNIFE THROBLED BY BERNES.—


