Stripes Sent to Prison. Juan, Porto Rico, Sept. 17 .-Edward Conde and Leondas Gillot, two socialists, who spoke in a recent meetinvolthe American Enteration of Laborwere put on trial today for insulting the American dag and threatening the life of Governor Hunt.

Their speeches teemed with abuse of the government. One of the prisoners was accused of advising the workmen upon the return of the governor on October I from the United States to parade carrying black flage and then to make demands upon the government. If there demands were refused, the speaker added, the alternative of killing Governor Hunt remained.

The other orator was said to have declared that the American dag was a rag fit to cover rascals and criminals. The accused vehemently depied the charges. They were tried before Justi e Kopel, convicted of anarchist conduct, and

sentenced to six months in prison.

Justice Kopel said the flag is higher than the law and anarchists need never expect any mercy in his court. The Porto Rican official warning that attacks on the flag and government must stop. The Americans and loyal Porto Ricans are jubilant, while the socialists are angry at today's decision. The convicted men will appeal from the judgment declaring that Justice Kopel had no jurisdiction and there is no law covering the offense. The interest in
