

NO CARS-- NO WORK

Southern Pacific Shortage Ties
Up More Mills—Cottage Grove
Now Feels the Effect.

APPEAL IN VAIN.

No doubt, no other company has suffered for the want of transportation more than the Pacific Timber Company. This company has practically shut down every branch of its extensive enterprises except the sawmill at Drain, which runs on half time in order to supply the local demand for lumber at Roseburg, says the Cottage Grove correspondent of the Oregonian. In an interview, T. K. Campbell, president of this concern, said Monday:

"Orders that we received for lumber last May were cancelled during the month of October. We have at least \$50,000 worth of lumber and piling ready for shipment, but we cannot get cars. Our appeals to the Southern Pacific for cars have been without avail. We employ several hundred men and our payroll ranges from \$12,000 to \$15,000 per month, and nearly all of these men are now idle."

This company owns the Drain, Alea and Rouse mills. The sawmill at Alea, eight miles south of here on the Southern Pacific, was erected this Fall and has a capacity of 75,000 feet per day. Mr. Campbell said it cost \$25,000 and the new plant has not shipped a foot of lumber. His company was also handling the products of five other mills, but on account of not being able to get cars all these mills are idle. The company has over 3,000,000 feet of sawlogs on hand.

Many of the orders they had from California and other states have been cancelled. They have 30,000 piling distributed along the Southern Pacific track between Woodburn and Drain ready to be dispatched on short notice. The company started in business five years ago at Alea on a very small scale by getting out railroad wood principally. Its business expanded rapidly and it is now one of the large concerns in the state. Mr. Campbell says the outlook for relief is anything but cheerying.

Mr. Phillip Hohl on Monday informed the NUGGET reporter that his mill had a quantity of lumber on hand that was awaiting cars for transportation. He had a market for the lumber in San Francisco, but the orders have been cancelled on account of non-delivery. He said that he would go to Portland this week and try and find a market there.

The Pacific Timber Co., of Cottage Grove, have their new mill at Alea, six miles south of Cottage Grove, ready to operate. The capacity of this mill is about 75,000 feet daily. This mill is very admirably located for handling lumber cheaply, as the logs drop by gravity to the mill pond, where a flume carries the logs onto the deck of the mill. The lumber falls from the saws to the railroad track and yards. A planing mill will be erected later. This company has two mills located on the Coast Fork of the Willamette, about twelve miles from Cottage Grove. This stream is used to drive tides and lumber to the railroad. An in-transit rate has been secured from the Southern Pacific to carry this lumber to Alea, where it will be prepared for shipment. The finishing lumber from the company's mill at Drain will be handled in the same manner, thus centralizing the finished product at one point. This company has a machine shop at Lathrop, where in addition to other machine work they are making a first class logging block. The car situation has been felt very keenly by this company, as company with other valley mills, as it handles the output of five small mills in addition to its own product—Oregon Timber.
