Having had many years experience in the mining districts of Colorado and other states, and after spending several months in Bohemia, I feel justified in saying:

There are a large number of good mining properties in that district, which will, when the necessary transportation facilities shall have been provided, and capital secured to develop them, with mills installed, be second to but few, if any of the great mining camps.

To assist by all honorable methods in attracting the attention of capital to these resources will be one of the objects of this paper.

Matters of a local and social nature will receive due attention.

Politically, the paper will be Republican, where it has always been with the exception of the past month, it will, however, stand at all times for the best interests of Cottage Grove and vicinity.

I hope and expect that our social and business relations will be mutually pleasant and profitable.

SUNDAY NIGHT'S MEETING.

The meeting at the Opera House, Sunday night, under the auspices of the church was well attended.

Reverend Billington, Fess and Boyles closed their churches for the occasion. Mr. Lester Lewis presided, and after singing by the audience, prayer by Rev. Billington and a solo by Mrs. Fess, the speaker of the evening Capt. L. D.
