At the organization meeting held recently a story was told of the visit of an Oregon mining man to Yale college. While looking over the specimens in the geological department the visitor found a specimen of gold bearing the label "From Gold Hill, Oregon, State of California." It was also stated at the meeting that Oregon is credited with a portion of the production made by California mines. The new organization will work for the advancement of Oregon's mining industry, and also see to it that the knocker is suppressed. Here's luck to the Baker City Miners' Association! Bonds and Mortgages.

The mine owners of Bohemia Mining District perfected a Mine Owners' Association last October with Andrew Brund as president, and Al Churchill, secretary. There are many good reasons why the owners of mining properties should have an association of this character, and the Nugget suggests that every mining district, no matter how small, for it will grow, organize a Mine Owners' Association.

In the first place it will afford an opportunity for them to become better acquainted by calling a meeting occasionally.

Matters of importance can be brought before it, and discussed and by united action something accomplished, which when left to individual effort would fail. No district can afford to have false and exaggerated statements made concerning it and when it is known that an association is ready to protect its interests they will not be so apt to be made.

The matter of unwarranted jumping of claims, frequently causing an honest miner trouble and expense, can be largely controlled by united action. The questions arising between the district and county, such as roads, etc. can be better arranged when presented as the action of the whole district.

In matters of mining legislation, with an organization in every camp and they working in harmony, much can be accomplished.

And they can knock the "knocker" if any be found.

UTAH'S GOOD SHOWING.
The Desert News of Salt Lake City in its Christmas edition makes a very cheerful estimate of the production of metals in the State of Utah for 1903. It places the total production at \$34,000,000, giving gold \$4,000,000, silver \$20,000,000, lead \$5,000,000 and copper \$5,000,000. It further estimates the amount of dividends paid by the mining stock companies only, at \$4,769,016. These mines from where this wealth was produced, were but prospects not many years ago. Oregon has many such prospects which need development.
