## OREGON UNIVERSITY.

We are in receipt of the second number of volume one of the new series of University of Oregon bulletins. It is from the pen of Professor Glen, of the department of "English Language and Early English Literature" at the university and consists of two studies in Anglo-Saxon poetry. These studies are popular in character and seek to interest the "lady" as well as those specially attracted to the subject of our early poetry.

The poems "Beowulf" and "The Christ" are the themes treated in the bulletin and probably no other two poems in any genre of our literature exhibit such striking contrasts as these. The method used in the treatment of these poems serves to bring out these differences with clearness and emphasis.

The first poem is divided into three parts which are taken up and discussed in order, after an introduction that treats of the life of the Anglo-Saxon and shows how naturally such a poem as "Beowulf" grew out of the conditions that surrounded the Anglo-Saxons of England and their forefathers of the continent.

The second poem "The Christ" has also three divisions:—"The Nativity," "The Ascension," "The Day of Judgment" which are treated consecutively. While the first poem is representative of Anglo-Saxon heathenism, the second is fervid with the spirit of Christianity. This seems remarkable in consideration of the fact that not one hundred and fifty years had passed since Christianity was introduced into England.

The writer of the bulletin seems to be thoroughly in sympathy with his subject and in view of the many theories concerning "Beowulf," the author of "The Christ," he has made his statements concerning "Beowulf" very conservative. This effort to make more popular the study of our Anglo-Saxon literature is timely and commendable.

**THE PUBLIC SCHOOL ART EXHIBIT.**

The public school will place on exhibition February 2nd to 6th in the new bank building, afternoons and evenings.

The exhibits consists of more than 200 works of art, composed of paintings, photographs of the world's great paintings and sculptures, etc., furnished by the Horace K. Turner Co., of Boston. The object is to secure funds with which to improve our school rooms.

**NOTES OF GENERAL INFORMATION**

**Gathered From Exchanges.**

Under ordinary circumstances quicksilver can be produced in California at a cost of \$3 per ton of ore mined and smelted, which makes it possible to work profitably ore averaging from 0.3 to 0.6 per cent of quicksilver, and occasionally ores of lower grade.

A feature of Colorado's game exhibit at the World's Fair will be a live animal display. The exhibit will include every species of wild quadruped found in the state. James S. Bush, a veteran hunter, is the field collector for this exhibit and he has gathered a sufficient number of animals to make a respectable looking "Zoo." Most of the collection is at City Park, Denver, and consists of two cinnamon bears, one black bear, one brown bear cub, two mule deer, one white tail deer, one mountain sheep, three antelope, two raccoons, two badgers, two lynxes, two gray wolves, three coyotes and one bald eagle. At Elitche's Gardens are a mountain lion, two golden eagles and two swifts. Numerous stuffed animal specimens will also be shown in Colorado's game exhibit.

Hon. W. E. Yates was on last Saturday elected Master of the Corvallis Grange.

Charles White, 81 years of age and a pioneer to Oregon in 1850 died on Friday last at Eugene.

E. Kinney, miller of Salem, was recently elected manager of the Willamette University football team.

The members of the Oregon Game and Fish Association have started an active campaign against violators of state game laws.

The Willamette Valley Base Ball League has been dissolved and the Oregon State Base Ball League has taken its place. It is the intention to have a six club league, Eugene, Salem, Albany and Roseburg are already members.

Henry H. Alderman, sheriff of Tillamook county, shot himself Sunday, out in his own barn, ill health and financial troubles are given as the cause.

Judge Melvin C. George, of the state circuit court, recently declared the law creating the state board of barber examiners unconstitutional and invalid.

H. D. Egbert who killed John G. Saxton in Harney county last October, will be hanged at the penitentiary at Salem Friday unless executive clemency be shown.

Mayor Harrison with seven other officials is held by coroners jury to the grand jury as responsible in the Inouqui fire. A special grand jury will next week take up the matter.

Nearly two hundred coal miners perished in the explosion in the Harwick mine, Pa.

The Batson oil fields of Texas have produced seven oil well with a short time with a daily average of 10,000 barrels of oil.
