**OUTLOOK FOR 1904.**

Thus far all the information gleaned from the various exchanges of the mining states indicates that the year 1904 will be a remarkable one for the production of gold and silver. It will very likely be far and away ahead of any previous year of our history.

The time was, and not so very long ago, when mining was regarded as a species of gambling especially by the Eastern public, but it has now become to a great extent a favorite method of investment and many of the greatest financiers have been and now are turning their attention to the mining industry. In all other lines of commercial affairs there is simply an exchange of products for dollars, and an increase of money in one locality means a decrease somewhere else; but every ounce of gold produced from the mines adds twenty dollars to the world's wealth and no one is the poorer thereby.

Like all other lines of business where large profits can be made, frauds will be perpetrated and fake schemes presented, and it is these things the legitimate mining enterprises have the greatest cause to fear and to contend with. The "get rich quick" concerns and guaranteed dividends while a property is in its prospective stage of development are a special menace to the honest promoter who is attempting to secure funds to carry forward his mining enterprise and who must state that both money and time are needed to place the property he represents upon a paying basis. As a suggestion to investors in mining lines:

First learn something about the personnel of the parties representing the company. It is not likely men of good repute and standing in other affairs of life, will deliberately enter into a fraudulent mining scheme. It is possible they may be mistaken and conditions may change so that all of the promised plans may not mature, as a rule however, most people invest with a full knowledge of a possible chance against them. It is an honest deal the investor wants and should have.

**THE REV. DR. FORD.**

The Rev. Dr. Ford will hold the Second Quarterly Conference of the M. E. Church of this place for this year next Sunday. Dr. Ford has served the Methodist Church of Cottage Grove as presiding elder for the last seven years. This year closes his term for the Eugene district. He is regarded by his church as one of the great and brainy men. For administrative ability it is repeatedly stated that he has no superior in his denomination. He is one of the most prominent clergymen of his denomination upon the Pacific Coast, and has the unusual record of having been a presiding elder twenty-eight years out of thirty-five of his ministry. He was for years a leading clergyman in the South and rendered his church and his country great service during the reconstruction period of our history. Times are reputed to have been most interesting for him during the reign of the Ku Klux.

Tradition has it, which is probably more fact than fiction, that his navy and his bible would be placed side by side while edifying his hearers with the ministry of the gospel. It is said that he would watch as well as pray during public prayers. He came to the State of Washington at a time when his services were most needed there by his church. He has served as a presiding elder in Oregon during the last twelve years.

There is about to be issued from the press of his denomination a book from his hand entitled "The Presiding Eldership of the Methodist Episcopal Church." This book will have a wide reading wherever Methodists are known.

He is also a delegate to the General Conference which meets in Los Angeles next May. He has been elected to every General Conference of his church since 1878.

Cottage Grove has been favored of late by visits from great men.
