He with others procured snow shoes and with sleds loaded with tools, blankets and provisions struggled over the great continental divide on to the new camp. It was at this time the writer first met him. Mr. Russell prospected, located claims and mined in the vicinity of Aspen until the drop in silver, when he like others, sought new fields, and finally arrived in Bohemia, where he held mining property at the time of his death. He leaves a mother, in Ill., and a son in Colorado Springs, Colo.
