The city spends \$900 per day for a water supply for its 40,000 inhabitants, giving an aver age of nine gallons per capita daily Occasionally there is a serious fire and the fire department is not capable of handling it. Comparing the water supply of the city with that of cities of the same size in the United States, we find that Binghamton, N. Brockton. Mass., population 40,063, has a per capita consumption of 33.23 gallons dail and over half of the services are metered.
