We've Heard From Brown.

Republic Mo., Mar. 22, 1904.
BOHEMIA NUGGET: As I said
in my former letter I arrived in El
Paso at 5, 6 and 7 o'clock. The S.
P. train runs from Los Angeles to
El Paso on coast time and as El
Paso has mountain time it of course
arrived one hour early. Trains
leaving El Paso going East use
central time, consequently the S.
P. depot had 5 o'clock, the city
had 6 o'clock mountain time, and
the Texas Pacific had 7 o'clock
central time, and as I had no clock
I missed my train and laid over in
El Paso 24 hours.

El Paso is quite an interesting
place and as I arrived on Sunday
evening I found all the visitors
very much excited over the bull
fight that had just taken place
across the line in Juarez and the
majority of them being Americans
they had but few words of praise
except for the bulls. I had the
pleasure of seeing two bulls that
had been in the ring and not
killed but they would certainly
have looked better had they been
on the block. I also saw the
carcasses of two bulls and one horse
that had met death in the ring—
the horse having been gored to
death by the bulls. I never saw a
bull fight and after hearing a de-
scription given by those who did
witness it, I believe I had rather
spend the dollar some other way.

El Paso is an interesting place—
at least I suppose it is, the people
say so. If the regions of the infir-
mity were not already well established I
would vote for El Paso. It has the
disreputable characters and climate
highly suited to that purpose. The
thermometer registered 96 the day
I was there and as it hadn't rained
since "time whereof the memories
of man runneth not to the contrary"
the streets were somewhat dusty.
The town consists of Mexican
greasers and government officials
who put in most of their time look-
ing wise and drawing their salary.
Juarez, the Mexican town across
the line, is a permanent failure and
is made up of Chinamen trying to
get across the line into America
and Mexicans trying to trade the
unsuspecting American. Mexican
"Free Silver" for good money.

All goods sold in Juarez have
two prices. If paid for in Ameri-
can money the price is just half
what it is in Mexican money. I
ate dinner at a Chinese restaurant
and when I was through and asked
the price "John" replied "You pay
in Mexican or Mexicano" I asked
him what was the difference and he
said "Mexican mon 25 centos, Mexi-
cano 50 centos." I paid American
money. I paid 5 cent street car
fare in American money and 10
cents Mexican money for exactly the
same distance.

The Mexican in Mexico will
give twice the amount of goods for
25 cents in American money that
they will for 25 cents in Mexican
money, and Mexican is enjoying
all the glories of the free coinage of
silver, however one wouldn't ex-
pect a nation of bull fighters to
know much about finance.

I left El Paso Monday evening at
7:30 central time and arrived in Ft
Worth, Texas, the next evening
about 8:15 where I took a 16 hour
stop over, but as the majority of the
time was spent in the hotel asleep
I did not learn anything of special
interest of the town. I left Ft
Worth the following morning via
Paris and arrived in Republic in a
beautiful snow storm about 10
o'clock Thursday morning, Feb. 18.
I might add here that as I came
through Texas I saw many people
busy planting corn and getting in
the earlier crops, but with the
present high price of cotton, most
all land available will be used for
that purpose. Cotton planting
will begin about the first of April.

COAL ON THE PACIFIC COAST.

In experimenting with coke for
the purpose of working the iron
ores which are found in Santa
Catarina, Lower California, it was
found that coke which was a pro-
duct of Oregon coal compared fa-
vorably with Eastern coke and will
probably be used by the Pacific
Steel Company, which will treat
the ore at the reduction works to be
erected on San Diego bay.

A dispatch received from Tac-
oma, Wash., states that the West-
ern Fuel Company has penetrated a
fine seam of coal under the harbor
of Nainaimo. A tunnel was driven
nine hundred feet from the shore
through hard rock and the coal
was struck near Protection island.
The coal is reported to be almost
as hard as eastern anthracite.

The lack of coking coal on the
Pacific coast has retarded hereto-
fore the development of the great
iron deposits which exist here and
if coal of a character suitable for
reduction purposes can be found it
will have the effect of opening up a
new industry and an important one,
for there are large deposits of iron
ore of excellent quality in many
of the states and territories of the Pa-
cific coast.

BOISE IN THE RACE.

Evening Telegram.
Competition for the permanent
home of the American Mining Con-
gress is augmented by Boise City
entering the lists. The Capital
news has taken up the matter, and
advocating some action being taken.

"Denver, Salt Lake, Helena and
San Francisco have entered the
race to secure the permanent home
of the American Mining Congress.
Denver has gone so far as to assure
the congress of the donation of
ground for a suitable building."

"As the president of the con-
gress, Judge J. H. Richards, lives
in Boise, and as this city is really
among the most central in the
American mining states, it would
be a splendid achievement to secure
the location of this permanent home
here."

"The mining congress is doing
better work every year for the great
industry it represents, and a perma-
nent home building in which would
be held annual sessions and which
would contain a permanent mineral
exhibit unequalled anywhere would
be a leading attraction in any city.
Here is work for the Chamber of
Commerce, and success would
mean the annual gathering in Boise
of the leading mining men of the
United States and the attraction to
Idaho's mineral field of untold
capital."

Boston's Oil Field.

Twenty-seven wells have been
drilled in the new Boston field and
one dry hole in the number. Two
wells deliver from 25,000 to 28,000
barrels of oil a day. The crude
product will refine 40 per cent il-
luminating oil and 5 per cent gas
naphtha. The Boston field today, it
is asserted, is capable of producing
more than another pool on the con-
tinent. Boston's big production is
not going to last always. Every-
body knows that. But while it
lasts it is the biggest thing since
Spindie Top's best day, and it is
more important than Spindie Top
because there is more than twice
as much illuminating oil in the
Boston crude as there is in the pro-
duct of the older field. It is stated
that not more than 18 per cent il-
luminating has been obtained from
the Spindie Top crude. Sour Lake
crude runs about the same as does
Jennings and Saratoga, according
to various authorities.
