**Commercial Club.**

The great need of a Commercial Club in this city where the business men could meet for recreation and the discussion of matters of interest and importance to the city's welfare has been recognized for some time.

With a view of bringing about the desired result, a number of the business men were invited to meet on Tuesday night at Garman and Hemenway's store and canvass the situation.

A number responded to the call and all agreed that a club should at once be organized.

It was thought best however, as the Oregon Co-Operative Association was already organized and in working order, to request its executive committee to take the matter up and present at the meeting already called for next Tuesday night, plans for the organization of a club. All members of the association should be present at that time.

**School Grounds.**

Those in charge of the school house grounds are desirous of having a fine flower garden and are at considerable pains to accomplish this result. Recently parties have in the absence of the keeper entered the grounds, picked the flowers and in some instances destroyed the plants. It is hoped a word of warning will be sufficient as further depredations will not be overlooked.

**Opera House Needed.**

At a recent gathering of a number of business men of the city the question of the need of an opera house was incidentally mentioned. The suggestion that it could be erected through the organization of a stock company met with the approval of all present; a number volunteered to subscribe liberally for stock. It is believed that outside of the convenience and satisfaction of having a house of this kind in the city it would, if properly located and constructed, prove to be a profitable investment.

It is probable the lumbermen would be willing to furnish the lumber for stock while a considerable proportion of the labor could be paid for by stock subscription. Who will make the next move.

**Danger From Fire.**

The fire in Eugene Monday morning which caused considerable damage and under more unfavorable conditions might have proven much more disastrous, should serve as a warning to the people of Cottage Grove.

There is great danger from improperly constructed chimneys and poorly connected stove pipes. The Nugget suggests the authorities cause an examination to be made by some competent person, of every stove and chimney at least in the business portion of the city. The old saying an "Ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" may prove true in this matter. The Eugene Guard says:

**NARROW ESCAPE FOR CITY.**

In that case the fire would have easily spread to the business houses and it would have been impossible to check it.
