The county judge by reason of his position has much to say about what expenditures should be made and where they should be made. A large amount of money is expended each year on roads and bridges. The taxpayers are interested in having a good business man at the head of the board of the board of county commissioners.  
 The republicans of Lane county made an excellent selection when they nominated Hon G R Chrisman for county judge. Mr. Chrisman has been for many years identified with Lane county and is one of the largest taxpayers in the county. He is a careful business
