The "Alkali" Spots of Illinois.

The so called "alkali" spots of central and southern Illinois usually occur in the midst of the very best farming lands and vary from a few square rods to several acres in extent. They differ from the alkali soil of arid lands in being not sodium carbonate, but magnesium carbonate, a mild alkali, of which an excessive amount becomes poisonous to plants, especially corn and millet.

The Illinois experiment station recommends as the most practical method for improving these soils to provide good, deep underdrainage and then plow under coarse organic matter, such as straw, coarse manure, green oats, weeds, etc.

If no manure or other material is at hand it is well to sow oats on these spots, and if they grow rank and fall down plow them under. One or two heavy crops of green oats plowed under will usually put the soil in condition to grow one or more crops of corn, and with perfect drainage these soils will usually improve with heavy cropping, for they are frequently very rich in all elements of plant food, with plenty of the laid deep and made to work of necessary by surrounding them with straw, corncobs, brush, etc.) in all that some of these spots need to make them grow corn.

The Young Brood.
If the brood has bowel trouble give a little boiled rice or milk curds; if constipated, a little buttermilk or oatmeal will probably remedy matters, says Mrs. Strubling in Farm and Ranch. A droopy chick will often be as bright as ever if given a drop of castor oil and kept in a warm place for a day. Our chicks have the run of the alfalfa, so get plenty of bugs and green stuff, but chopped lettuce and onion tops are always good. We feed corn bread left from dinner, but never raw cornmeal. We have found it more satisfactory to confine the old hen for a week in a latticed coop, allowing the chicks to run in and out at pleasure. After a week we allow them entire liberty if the weather is favorable, of course keeping them off the wet grass, seeing that they have access to cool, clean water and plenty of shade.

Country Notes.
Eggs can be relied upon as being fertile in a week or ten days from the time a cock is put with the hens.
Get young chickens out of small coops as soon as possible and encourage them to go on perches at an early age. Keep them growing and do not crowd them in the houses.
When a brood of chicks is not flourishing, look for lice. Put a little asafetida in the water and change the feed.

After all, the feed is not so important to the chicks' welfare as freedom from insect pests, especially lice.
Russet dried in the stove until easily crumbled, then slightly moistened with raw egg, are good for chicks. So are hard boiled eggs chopped fine.
When to Build a Henhouse.
Poultry houses should never be built so late in the season that time will not permit them to be thoroughly dried before the winter season sets in.

WINE OF CARDUI
RAISING TURKEYS.
How to Care For and Feed Poultry to Get Good Results.
About the twenty-fifth day dust the hen thoroughly with a good insect powder, and after eggs begin to chip close the nest up tight, for as soon as the first pullets are out a few hours they will get out of the nest and stroll off sometimes causing the hen to follow with perhaps a few pullets, says H. Simmons in Western Poultry Journal. I take them from the nest about two hours after all are hatched. After taking the pullets from the nest I put them in a dry, warm coop with a small pen in front of the coop about 10 by 15 feet, for if the pen or yard is too large when the hen is confined in a coop pullets may huddle too far to the corner of the yard and not find their way back to the hen, and if left so for a few hours, even on a fine day, will be chilled almost to death.

I think it best not to feed the first few days, for the first few days thereafter good, sweet breadcrumbs, slightly moistened with sweet skimmed milk—now, remember I say "sweet," not milk that has stood around for a half day or more on a hot day. Feed very lightly three or four times a day for the first few days. In the morning I give a little skimmed milk to drink in a shallow clean dish, being careful to remove before souring. After they are three or four days old I put the hen with the pullets in a lot or pen of about 35 by 16 feet, using 16 foot boards and having the pen about 2 1/2 feet high, making the pen tight, so as to hold the pullets in, leaving the hen free to fly in or out at her will. In this way I have had my success. The hen will not go far from the pen, and pullets will be happy and contented if they have grass in the pen and proper attention is given.

It is best to give the hen, before feeding pullets, a feed of corn or other coarse grain to satisfy most of her hunger, so that she will not eat the more costly feed of her young. After the pullets are four or five days old I commence feeding with milk curds or cottage cheese mixed with breadcrumbs and steel cut oatmeal. A little coarse shorts may be added; also commence once a day to feed a little cracked wheat, and after two weeks old wheat may be fed whole. On very fine days I leave them out of the pen a part of the day, but get them up in the pen by at least 4 o'clock. After I get the hen in the pen I leave her to herself until after dark. I then take a fair sized A shaped coop and put it over her gently and close up well for the night. As soon as warm days come be sure to provide some sort of shade for them in their pen. Old boards fastened to south side of pen and sloping to north is fine and also makes a fine protection from sudden showers. After the pullets are six to seven days old they must be given the run of the field.
