FARMERS' INSTITUTES.

Young, Growing and Influential They Teach an All Important Art. By R. BENJAMIN, JR. Washington, D. C.—The importance and extent of the farmers' institute movement in this country received recognition by the government last year and were brought more prominently to general notice than ever before by the establishment of a new office in the office of experiment stations that was devoted to the duty of assisting the farmers' institute workers of the United States. To the charge of this office Hon. John Hamilton was appointed under the title of "farmers' institute specialist." There are probably many people, however, even among the farmers who still know little or nothing of farmers' institute work and the objects it seeks to accomplish. As to what the farmers' institute ought to be and what it ought to strive to do Specialist Hamilton has said:

"There was a time when the institute meeting was selected as an appropriate place for some agricultural pessimist to preach a funeral sermon. That day is past. The new gospel of agriculture is one of good news—of deliverance from ignorance, superstition and mediocrity—and the true minister in this service is a hopeful, helpful and enthusiastic man. The object is, in short, to educate not only the farmers, but the race, in the fundamental principles that underlie the all important art of producing animals and crops. It is the agency for disseminating information in agriculture that the platform is in molding public sentiment in political campaigns. It is the complement of the education forces now organized for uplifting agriculture in the United States."

The Sign of Health. The comb of the fowl is the sign over the door for either good or bad health, says Meersch in Western Poultry Journal. When in good health its appendage is blood red of a bright and tender color; when bad in health it is dark and of a bluish cast. There is something wrong, and an examination of the fowl itself will often disclose the disease. First look in the mouth to see if there are any canker sores or signs of roup. A yellowish tinge in a bad colored comb indicates liver complaint. Often a change of food is all that he needs. If you have any onions, a good feed of these often does as well as to make a bran mash or boll up a kettle of vegetables.

Time to Feed Chickens. Chickens should not be fed until they are at least thirty-six hours old. It is a serious mistake to feed them earlier. Too early feeding is the cause of indigestion and bowel trouble in many cases. We try to keep the temperature of the brooder between 90 and 95 degrees throughout the first week. After the first week the temperature is gradually lowered, generally speaking, about one degree a day.—Ontario Agricultural College Bulletin.

Grill For Chickens. The New York experiment station ascertained that the addition of ground rock phosphate to rations both with and without animal food was followed by better growth and on the whole from less food than the addition of finely ground oyster shell.

Food mixed with finely ground oyster shell was less healthful and less efficient than the same food mixed with fine sand. Mixing bone ash and ground oyster shell in the food resulted in more rapid growth than the mixing of sand alone, but injury attributed to ground oyster shell made the feeding less profitable.

Crossing Breeds. Do not cross your breeds. It is the beginning of a down grade step, says Poultry News. No one has attempted crossing the breeds who did not reduce his flock to mongrels.

Laying Tile in Back Lawns. Muck lands when thoroughly drained frequently make veritable garden spots. But unless the tile lines are laid with sufficient fall, preferably in the clay subsoil, and carefully covered the soft muck is liable to soon clog them. We have found that a little extra care in attending to these points will pay exceedingly well and prolong the period of usefulness of the drains for years. The life of a drain carelessly laid in muck is very short. It is often advisable to put boards both under and on top of the tiles, remarks Mr. Greiner in Farm and Fire.

Cockroaches and Hens. Always separate the cockroaches from the hens. Put the best ones for breeding by themselves and give them good food with a little stimulant now and then. A little cod liver oil will answer twice a week, says A. V. Meersch in Western Poultry Journal. This will get them up, and you will not be troubled with infertile eggs in the breeding season. Keep all cockroaches from all hens until they are fully grown and you want to use them. Eggs to be sold for eating are far better infertile, and you can be almost certain there will be no bad ones among them, they will keep better and longer, so it pays both ways to separate the male birds.

Jacking For Plum Cereals. Early in the morning and late in the evening the cerebelli beetles are more or less stupid and are easily jarred from their hold on the tree to sheets or cloth covered frames. They feign death (plus possum) when jarred. In order to capture them make a large frame of light wood and stretch cloth over it with a slot opening to the middle; place this under the tree, so that the trunk of the tree comes in the center of the frame; now strike quick, sharp blows on the lower limbs with a padded maul having a handle six to eight feet long. A long handled maul makes it possible to reach up into the tree. The beetles will fall to the sheet or frame and can be gathered up and dropped into kerosene.
