COMMERCIAL CLUB
Has it's Formal Opening on Friday July 1st.

It was but a few weeks ago that a few of the business men decided that a Club was a necessity for the city. Mr. Wm Garman secured a number of names of those who were willing to assist in the inauguration of a Club and a meeting was called at the office of the Pacific Timber Company. After some discussion it was decided to organize and establish a place where matters pertaining to the welfare of the city might be discussed as well as to meet for social entertainment.
OFFICERS ELECTED.
T. K. Campbell was elected President, Ben Lurch 1st vice, H. O. Thompson 2nd Vice, Wm Garman Treasurer, F. D. Wheeler Secretary. There were also seven trustees elected to look after the affairs of the Club.
The spacious suite of rooms over Garman and Hemenway's store were secured, remodeled and finely furnished.
There is a reading room where the latest periodicals and newspapers are on the tables.
The assembly room will comfortably seat some 75 or more persons, a coat room adjoins.
Probably the most interesting room for a majority of the members is the pool, billiard and card room.
A pool table, a billiard table and card tables are already in place.
On last Friday night the members met for the formal opening of the Club.
Some forty members were in attendance and the evening was spent in the discussion of business affairs and the playing of games. At about eleven o'clock all were invited to the banquet hall in the Jones and Phillip's building where a lunch had been prepared. President Campbell made a short address to the members, congratulating them upon the organization of such a large Club in so short a time and stated he believed their action would not only prove a success socially but from a business stand point as well. The membership is already close to 50 and others are expected to add their names to the list soon.

A CARD.
To the Citizens of Cottage Grove: It will be remembered that after much agitation and constant demand, a regulation sidewalk was constructed from the city limits to the Masonic and L. O. O. F. cemetery last winter by public contribution, a local committee devoted much time to this commendable enterprise in the face of many obstacles and discouragements. Upon its completion this much needed improvement was recognized as a most important, substantial and timely one by every citizen of the town and the committee was commended for its enterprise in vigorously pushing the work to completion.
