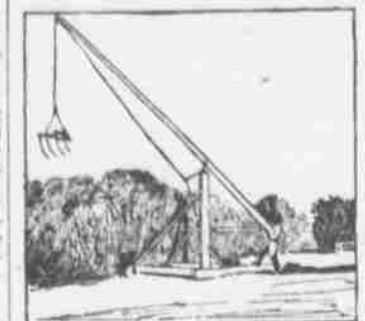

IN ALFALFA LAND.

The Hay Harvest and Its Machinery.
The Number of Cuttings.
It is best not to cut a crop of alfalfa
the first season, but to allow the
field to get well started for the next
year. However, under favorable cir-
cumstances one or even two or three
crops may be obtained the first year.
After the first year the number of cut-
tings depends upon the length of the
season and the altitude. A. S. Hitch-
cock, agronomist in charge of grass
and forage plant investigations, says
of this crop as grown in the north-
west states that at the higher altitudes
or latitudes not more than two cuttings

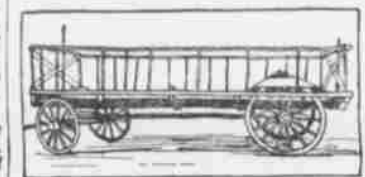


may be possible. In the upper San
Joaquin valley, in California, five or six
cuttings are usually obtained. In the
Loveless valley, Nebraska, where large
quantities of alfalfa are grown, three
cuttings are made, with a yield of five
to seven tons.

Alfalfa hay is prepared in the man-
ner usual for hay crops, but the opera-
tions are modified somewhat by climat-
ic conditions. Concerning methods in
the dry regions of the northwest Mr.
Hitchcock says: One man with a team
may mow about fifteen acres a day.
The alfalfa is usually raked within a
few hours after mowing, thrown into
bunches by hand and stacked as soon
as convenient. If the hay is allowed to
remain too long in the swath or wind-
row, too much loss of foliage occurs in
stacking on account of the dryness of
the air.

The hay is usually stacked by machi-
nery. If the stack is made in the
field, sweeps or bull rakes are occasion-
ally used for hauling the bunches to the
stacks, but these implements have the
serious objection of shattering the
leaves, causing corresponding loss of
valuable fodder. For this reason the
bunches are usually loaded by hand on
wagons provided with hayracks. At
the stack the hay is unloaded from the
wagons by horsepower, the machine
used for this purpose being called a
stacker or hay derrick.

The most common type of stacker
throughout the northwest is some mod-
ification of the pole, or most and boom
stacker. This is essentially a derrick
with pulleys and a hayrack, by which
several hundred pounds of hay can be
lifted from a wagon and deposited upon
the stack. The stackers are generally
homemade. The derrick may be sup-
ported by a heavy framework or may
consist of poles held in place by guy
ropes. The hay is usually lifted by
means of a fork, but nets are in com-
mon use in some sections. The most
common style of fork is that known as
the Jackson fork, or, outside of Califor-
nia, as the California fork. For alfalfa
the fork usually has four tines, but for
grass hay five or six tines. By means
of a small rope the operator upon the
wagon can dump the fork load of hay
upon the stack at any desired point.



COMMON TYPE OF HAYRACK.

One or two horses attached to the
lifting rope, or cable, furnish the power
to lift the load. The load on the fork
is swung over the stack by slightly
leaning the derrick toward the stack.
The fork then swings by its own
weight. The empty fork is drawn back
to the wagon by means of the dump
rope. Sometimes the load is swung
over the stack by hand. Another form
of fork occasionally seen is the har-
poon fork. Instead of the fork there is
sometimes used a net, also called a
sling or hammock. Three or four of
these are placed at intervals in the hay
as it is being loaded. At the stacks
the nets full of hay are lifted from the
wagon to the stack by means of de-
ricks.

Another form of stacker which has
proved very satisfactory is the cable
derrick. Forks or nets may be used
with this style. In eastern Colorado,
and parts of Wyoming an improve-
ment stacker is in common use.
The bunches may be brought to the
stacker with horse sweeps, but the dis-
tance must not be great or there will
be too much loss of leaves. Hence the
stacks are smaller than when the
bunches are brought by wagon.
The stacks of alfalfa are commonly
made about twenty-five feet wide and
high and, as long as convenient, often
100 or more feet.

NEWLY HATCHED CHICKS.

Hard and Soft Foods Equally Good
If Properly Compounded.
It matters not whether chicks are
started on hard or soft food. Both are
equally good and satisfactory, provided
they are properly compounded and the
soft food not made wet and sloppy.
Writes H. E. Moses in *Reliable Poultry*
Journal: "The same material that would
succeed if fed dry will if ground and
slightly moistened with skim milk cer-
tainly serve the same purpose and has
the advantage of being already ground,
therefore being quicker assimilated by
the chick and enabling it to make a
more rapid growth."

The objections many hold against
ground food for chicks will be found on
investigation to rest upon failures,
caused either by the use of unsuitable
material or the sloppy condition in
which it is fed. The first feed for
chicks should consist of stale bread
crumbs soaked in skim milk and
squeezed dry, and for the first two
days nothing else should be fed. This
cleanses the entire alimentary tract and
prepares the digestive organs for active
and perfect work. The feed for the
first ten days should be higher in heat
and fat forming material than for the
later growing period. A ratio of 1.5
will be found the most satisfactory for
early hatched chicks. Few farms fur-
nish as great a variety of grain and
seeds as is desirable, and some of them
should be purchased especially for this
use.

The principal ones needed are cracked
corn, broken wheat, the various mil-
let seeds, cracked kafir corn, hulled
oats or groats and stale breadcrumbs.
Rolled oats can also be used, but not
too freely, as they swell to the crop.
Cracked corn and wheat should make
up half the feed and the other half be
an assortment of the other seeds.

The chicks should be kept busy
scratching for their food, and if it be
scattered in chaff they will dig it out
and gain by the exercise.
The chicks should never be fed all
their crops will hold. Little and often
keep up a steady supply, and while
their crops are perhaps never more
than half filled they are finding all they
need and as fast as it is being digested.
After they are two weeks old I pre-
fer to keep constantly before them
either such a proper mixture of various
grains as is found in the best prepared
chick foods on the market or furnish
the full assortment of grains and seeds
in separate hoppers and, in addition,
one containing a constant supply of
beef scraps. If they are educated to
this method from the start, they will
practically balance their own ration.
This applies only to chicks that are to
be raised to maturity.

Poultry Notes.
The demand for turkeys always ex-
ceeds the supply.
Incubators should be watched if best
results are expected.
Let geese go to grass and they will
be practically self sustaining.
Fertile eggs do not keep as well as
those produced by an unmated hen.
Old hens and tough roosters make
good chickens raised during the picnic
season.
