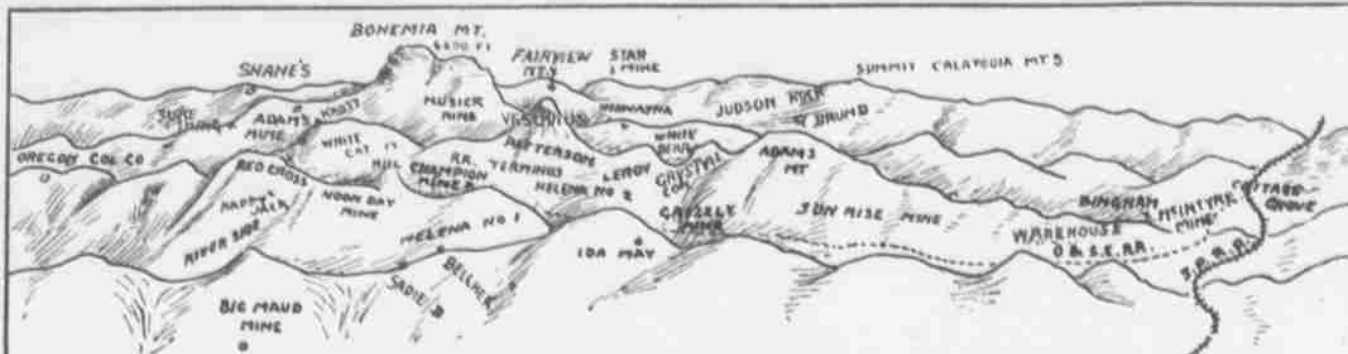

DRY FEEDING SYSTEM.

Increasing in Favor Among Breeders of Poultry.
The dry feeding system is meeting with increasing favor. Breeders who have tried one season of it claim that for the egg production is increased and they have more uniform growth with the young stock, says Wallace's Farmer. The feed boxes are kept filled with a variety of grains, the grit box is full, and also a box of charcoal. From these the fowls take their choice, balancing their own rations as they do in the summer time on free range.

It has not been very long since the farmer was contented with letting his poultry have the range of the feed yards, where was always a supply of corn, and of the barn, with its wheat and oat bin. It was a source of wonder to the town breeder that under such conditions the farmer's flock laid an egg, yet they continued to pay the grocer. Where there is a variety of grains it is not very different from the dry feed system if chickens are supplied with pure water, housed warmly in dry quarters and really have access to the feed bins. If they are supplied with grit and charcoal they will doubtless lay as well as the fancier's fowls on dry feed and free range.

Enthusiasm in Michigan.
Michigan reports a total attendance at its institutes for the year 1902-03 of 100,000, of whom 60,000 attended ten days' meetings. The amount of money expended was the state fund of \$7,500. Ten thousand copies of an institute report of 150 pages were published. The number of state speakers on the institute force was 100. For several years the largest attendance at one day institutes has been secured in small villages in the center of a thickly settled farming community, and the great difficulty has been found in securing a hall or a church sufficiently large to accommodate the crowd. While this is most common with the one day institutes, which are held for the most part in villages, a similar difficulty has been found during the year at a number of the two day institutes. In only one state, Kansas, do government statistics for 1902-03 give a larger average attendance than in Michigan, the figures being: Kansas, 409; Michigan, 407.

Women's Institutes.
This is an age of organizations, and in Canada a feature is being made of women's institutes, because, though the men and women of farms have many interests in common, there are times when the subjects discussed are not of common interest.

When to Build a Henhouse.
Poultry houses should never be built so late in the season that time will not permit them to be thoroughly dried before the winter season sets in.

The department of agriculture gives each woman's institute \$10 a year, and each also receives \$10 from either the farmers' institute or the county council, in some cases from both, thus giving it something to start with.

Another source of revenue is the yearly excursion to the agricultural college. Each farmers' institute has an excursion during the month of June. The women's institute receives some proportion of the funds provided. Each member pays a membership fee of 25 cents a year. This is within the reach of every one and gives all some interest in the institute. They belong to it.

Successful Institute Work.
One of the secrets of success in institute work has been in the practical character of the work done. In the great majority of cases the teachers at farmers' institutes thus far have been practical men and women, who have put their heart and soul into it simply for the good of the cause. President Salta of the American Association of Farmers' Institute Workers characterized the work as "young, growing and influential."

GREAT TOMATO TERRITORY.

One of the flourishing industries of "Egypt," in southern Illinois.
Calto, Ill.—"Egypt" sows its tomato seed in hotbeds in February and from that time on until settled weather the tomato grower waits with bated breath especially if all his eggs are in this one frail basket upon the chances and changes of frost and sun and wind that may mean plenty of money in his pocket later or a woeful emptiness of the same.

Southern Illinois is the Eden of the tomato in the north as is the Crystal Springs (Miss.) region in the south. It is estimated that over 1,000 car loads of half bushel crates each went out from Union county last season in spite of the fact that frost cut down many of the first plants set in the fields. These fields were computed at over 1,700 acres, and it is believed that the acreage this season will be even greater.

This industry of southern Illinois began many years ago near Golden, which is now a great shipping point. Like nearly every other agricultural specialty it requires a "hustler" behind it. Growing the plants from seed in hotbeds, protecting the beds with straw or canvas on cold nights, endeavoring to give the benefit of the sun in the day and providing ventilation whenever possible, all this calls for eternal vigilance, quick and good judgment and unlimited exertion. Plants are, as a rule, set out during the first two weeks or more of May. They are placed three to four feet apart, and a little commercial fertilizer or castor bean ponance is sprinkled around each. One four foot stake is driven for each plant, to which the plant is kept tied. This facilitates both the ripening and the gathering of the fruit.

Shipping the tomatoes may begin with the early varieties by June 20 and continue, according to the season, through August. Much of the shipping business is carried on through companies composed of growers and business men of various towns in the tomato district.

Union county is the leading portion of the tomato territory, which includes also Jackson, Johnson and Pulaski counties.

The Kane county (Ill.) farmers' institute is giving the boys cash prizes for corn.

Strawberries have been well protected by snow this winter, and a good crop is reported in prospect in Wisconsin.
