FOUND DEAD

Wallace McKibben an old Soldier and Citizen of City, Ends His Troubles Which were Caused by Sickness.

Last Sunday morning the residents of the city were startled and pained as well, when it was learned that Wallace McKibben an old and respected resident of the city had committed suicide by hanging himself in the barn. Upon investigation it was learned he had risen at about 5 o'clock as was his usual custom and went out of doors. When Mrs. McKibben arose a little later she looked in the yard and barn for him and becoming uneasy called her sons and told them she was unable to locate the father. Going upstairs in the barn he was discovered in a partially reclining position with his head through a loop in a strap which had been used by the boys to hang their clothes on to dry. Mr. McKibben has been in an enfeebled condition for a long time and has recently expressed a determination to quit this life, his greatest fear was that he might become violent and be sent to an asylum. On Saturday he had discussed the matters with his wife and was assured by her that she would not let him be taken from her.

Mr. McKibben was the youngest of 8 brothers, all of whom were soldiers in the Civil War. During his service he had a severe case of sun stroke also was injured in the head when a train which he was helping to guard was wrecked, ever since that time he has had bad spells especially during the hot weather and recent years has been unable to do any work. Sixteen years ago the family came from Russell, Kansas to Lane county the last few years their home being in this city, he was a member of the Methodist church here.

Mr. McKibben was born in Albron, Edwards county, Ill., in 1845. In 1864 he enlisted in Co. C, 11th Minnesota volunteers and served till close of war. He was married to Eliza Patten in Cameron, Mo., in 1870. Nine children have been born to them and all are still living and are located in the city or very close by. They are Effie Idelia, now Mrs. James Leabow; Cora Edna, now Mrs. Chas. Teeters; Rhoda Jennings, now Mrs. Geo. M. Miller; Arvilla Geanette, Charles Henry, Minnie Bell, now Mrs. Chas. Finerty; Joseph Ernest, Lewis W. and John Melvin.

There are four brothers who still survive him.

The funeral services were held at 10 o'clock Monday morning, Rev. Gardiner an old comrade conducting the services. The comrades of Approximox Post G. A. R. marched in a body to the residence and took charge of the exercises and held the usual Grand Army services at the Shields Cemetery. Many of the citizens attended the funeral, and the family have the sympathy of the entire neighborhood. J. F. McKibben of St. Helens and the only brother in the State was present at the funeral. He is the uncle of the six McKibben boys who are running the McKibben mill some three miles east of town.

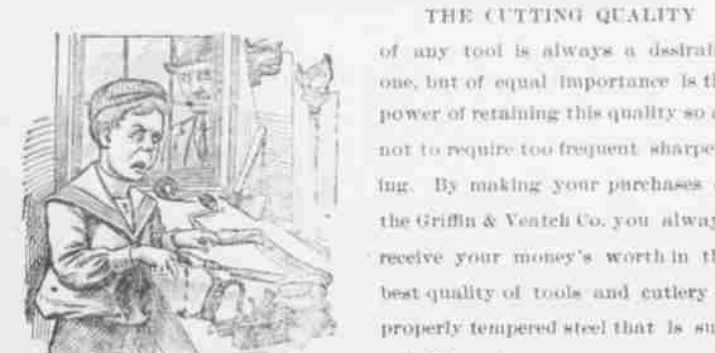

The day of publication of the Bohemia Nugget has been changed from Friday to Wednesday.

The new paper making machines which make the modern magazine possible are wonderful. There is one paper mill, for instance, at Rumford Falls, in the woods of Maine, which turns out every day a strip of paper one hundred and forty-four feet wide and one hundred and fifty miles long—long enough to put a sash around the earth every six months. There are, all told, eleven hundred paper mills in the United States, producing two hundred million dollars worth of paper a year. They burn up three million tons of coal yearly, and shred two million five hundred thousand cords of wood into pulp. About twelve million five hundred thousand trees are cut down to feed these paper mills, every tree being at least nine inches in diameter. One month's issue of the Woman's Home Companion requires as many trees as there are on a good sized farm. If you tear off a tiny corner of the page, and put it under a strong microscope, you will notice the little splinters of wood of which all magazine paper is made.—September Woman's Home Companion.

ELBOW ROOM.

Set out an orchard of apple trees ten feet apart, and you will have a very poor orchard. The trees will interfere with each other's growth; they will lack sunlight and moisture and the nourishment of the soil. Pruned, branchless trees will result; many will die. You will get a tenth of a crop of a very poor quality of apples.

Set out your trees forty feet apart, and each one will thrive, without trespassing upon its neighbor. Each will attain a symmetrical growth, with a deep, wide rootage, and broad low-spreading branches. That's the way the Lord intended apple trees to grow.

This isn't a disquisition upon apple trees. It's an allegory. Men are like apple trees—they need room. The more room a man has the more he'll grow and expand and develop.
