Railway Officials Visit Club

Sunday evening the heads of the various departments of the Southern Pacific railroad, consisting of General Manager A. B. Worthington, General Freight Agent R. B. Miller, General Superintendent J. P. O'Brien, Chief Engineer Goo. W. Boschke, Superintendent of Motive Power J. F. Graham, Superintendent of Telegraph E. A. Kleppel, Master Mechanic T. W. Younger, Division Engineer R. L. McDonald, Superintendent L. R. Fields, Assistant Manager of Telephone W. B. Gordon, arrived in the city and side-tracked their train for the night.

An invitation to these gentlemen to visit the Commercial Club was extended and accepted, they arriving at 8:30 and remaining for some two hours at the rooms. As many of the members of the Club as could be reached at so short a notice met the officials and discussed the freight rates on lumber and other products.

While there is a considerable difference of opinion concerning the rates as now charged by the Southern Pacific between the people of this locality and the railroad representatives and each side stated their positions in a plain way; there was nothing said or implied, but in a business way and of a pleasant nature.

The occasion for so many of the railroad officials being together, is a general inspection of the line and deciding how and where repairs and improvements shall be made. As it is their desire to see every portion of the road, they travel only during the day.

Manager Worthington stated the road was prepared to expend one million five hundred thousand dollars at once and there would be more to follow.

Whether any immediate good will result from the conference or not, still the meeting of the officials and people and the opportunity afforded to learn the views of each side should cause a better understanding.

The Club members were pleased to receive these gentlemen and hope to be able to meet them whenever they have occasion to visit the city.
