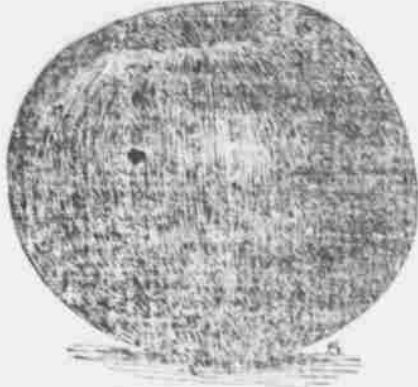


# FARM GARDEN

## HANDSOME NEW APPLE.

Fruit a Good Shipper and Trees Good Bearer.

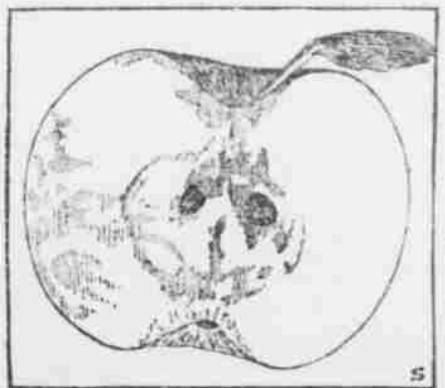
Handsome one naturally expects a Kentucky product to be. So it is no surprise that the name Fall Beauty has been selected as appropriate for a new apple which has originated in the Blue Grass country. The apple, according to the description of H. Garman of the state experiment station, is not only a beauty, but has other good qualities. The apples are sometimes deeper on one side than the other, but generally quite symmetrical. The weight seems to average a fraction above half a pound. Other points are: Color, deep purplish red, sometimes completely so, again only or largely on

the exposed side; striped, with deeper purple and pale waxen yellow; when fully ripe, with other yellow, the stripes contracting and extending into the cavity at the calyx end; marked with evident other yellow dots, these becoming especially conspicuous where the purplish red is deepest; region about the calyx end sometimes extensively waxen yellow.

Flesh white at first, becoming creamy when thoroughly ripe; flavor not striking, but pleasant; subacid; skin rather tough, thus calculated to protect it from insect and fungous injury and to render it a good shipper. Ripe Sept. 22. Mr. Garman says: While it is adapted only for fall use, it ripens at a time when few apples as good are in a condition for the table, the early ones being long gone and the late ones not yet sufficiently ripe. It keeps very well.

Unfortunately the cut cannot show the richness of the coloring of the Fall Beauty.

According to Mr. Piper, the propagator, the growth and foliage of his trees resemble those of the Rome Beauty. In bearing, he says, it is as regular as Rome Beauty or Ben Davis.

**Not a Commercial Quantity.**  
The Uruguay potato (Solanum commersonii), which has attained considerable newspaper notoriety of late, has been given some attention in this office on account of the disease resistant qualities claimed for it. We have succeeded in obtaining a few tubers for our own trials and have also become acquainted with the results of several experiments made last year with seed introduced by our office of seed and plant introduction and distribution. Our representatives abroad have also acquired some information regarding it. We have, however, not been able to secure any confirmation of its meritorious qualities. It is a wild variety with very small tubers. Those that we have had in this office have rarely exceeded one inch in diameter. They are said to be bitter. The plant is very stoloniferous (putting forth suckers), and it is doubtful whether it is adapted to our climate. The question of disease resistance also remains unproved. Further use will be made of the species in our plant breeding work. We will state to your readers that the plant is not a commercial quantity in any sense of the word; that, aside from its possible value to plant breeders, it possesses no interest whatever to any farmer in this country; that there is little or no seed on the market; that seed is difficult to obtain from foreign sources, and that the department has no seed for distribution and no printed information concerning it.—W. A. Orton, Department of Agriculture, in Orange Judd Farmer.

**Blueberries in Maine.**  
"The blueberry owner divides his land into three portions. Each year he picks the berries from one portion, burns another portion and allows the third to rest. The first year after the land is burned over the blueberry bushes sprout and grow a few inches. The second year they yield a full crop of berries. The third season the crop is small and of little value, and the bushes reach a condition in which they can be burned most effectively.  
"Under this system of blueberry culture the land does not 'run out' with constant use for the same crop," says a circular of the department of agriculture.

# FRUIT FLOWERS

## DUST SPRAYING.

The New Movement and What a Missionary Says of Its Benefits.

The fruit growing regions of Missouri seem to be the center of the new dust spraying movement—i. e., the use of dust instead of water as a vehicle for poisons. Pacht fruit growers also report favorably upon it. Some of its advantages are touched upon as follows by J. R. Haldeman of Missouri:  
In the first place, we use the fine dust of air slacked lime, which is a fungicide and insecticide in itself, and this dust blown upon by the proper machine fills the air with fine dust and settles upon the foliage in such a way as to cover it completely and much more effectively than any liquid spray can do. And into this conveyor can be mixed all that can be mixed into a liquid spray and many other ingredients that will not dissolve in water.

**Lime Dust an Enemy to Insect Life.**  
In the liquid spray the water is thrown up and falls upon the foliage, which forms of itself a shed much like the roof of a house. This gathers and runs off in drops and streams, carrying the very material that is to accomplish the work of killing insects to the ground, while the dust spray retains whatever you may put into it, dropping upon the foliage and there resting to accomplish its work.

Besides, it is thrown into the trees and up on the underside of the leaves, by which it reaches any eggs or insects that may be on the underside of the leaves, that it would be impossible to reach by the liquid spray, and kills them. You find lime dust is an ever-lasting enemy to all insect life. It chokes or closes the breathing organs of the insect and renders the foliage of the trees so offensive to them that they either migrate or die.
