**G. A. R. CAMPGROUND READY**

Major Bell invites Old Soldiers to Come to Sellwood Park.

Major T. C. Bell, superintendent of the G. A. R. campground in the park at Sellwood, has issued notices that the grounds there are ready for campers. The campground is free to G. A. R. and Women's Relief Corps members and families. Bull Run water is to be had in the park. Cars stop at the park. Tents and cots have been put up for rent at low price. There will be a restaurant on the ground. Major Bell has made arrangements to keep a complete register of all visiting comrades, giving the regiment and state from which the veterans come. For campers there is an abundance of fuel free from the near-by sawmill. Immediately following the encampments at Oregon City, for Oregon, and at Vancouver for Washington, the veterans will gather at the park for the first big campfire. The Sellwood Park will be the gathering place of the veterans this summer, when they are not attending the Fair, and they expect to have an all-Summer reunion. Old soldiers who have not met since they parted on the battle-fields at the close of the war, or when they were discharged, will here renew their comradeship in a succession of camp fires, around which the old stories will be told by those who were the characters and actors. Members of the local post say that the old soldiers are everywhere looking forward with pleasure to the reunions and campfires that are planned for the Summer in Sellwood Park. The people of Sellwood have responded quite liberally toward cleaning up the grove, and will do their part in making the stay of the old soldiers and families, who may camp at the park, pleasant. Major Bell is ready to give any information concerning the grounds and how to reach them.
