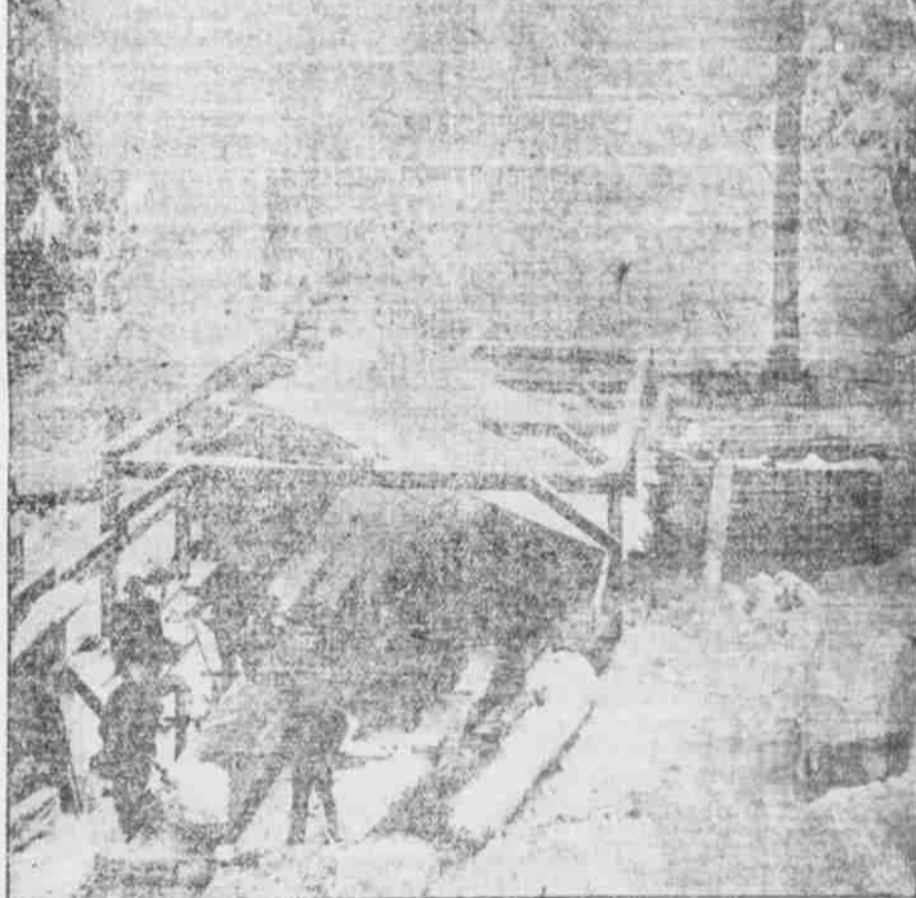
The enterprising farmers have finished their telephone line to Cottage Grove, and hope soon to connect with the switch board there.

San Francisco, August 1.—In an experiment conducted by Dr. Albert J. When the electrodes were brought in contact with about an inch square of the wall of the organ the galvanometer registered nearly ten milli-volts of direct electrical current. It is claimed that this action proves that the whole process of indigestion in an electro-

As is well known the price of the pure metal is greater than that of gold and there should be profit in saving it even though it occurs in very small quantities. There is no question but what the earlier miners frequently overlooked the platinum in the placer gravels and that much of it has gone into the waste heaps.

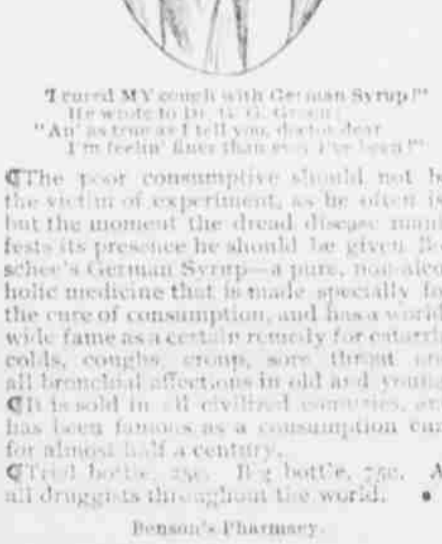
