Objects of the American Mining Congress.

The purchase of this organization is to advance the mining and metallurgical industries in all their various branches in the United States. To assist in bringing about a more perfect co-operation between the Government of the United States and the development of mining and metallurgy; to encourage education in practical and scientific mining and the dissemination of scientific information bearing upon the development of the metallic and non-metallic mining resources of the United States; to promote a more co-operative tendency in the evolution of agriculture, mining, manufacturing, transportation and commerce; and for the particular purpose of bringing the mining men of the United States into closer relation with one another, and of promoting a friendly feeling for one another through social intercourse and the discussion of mutual interests.

These purposes are to be accomplished by:

1. The creation of a Department of Mines and Mining, through which increased assistance and co-operation of the National Government may be secured.

2. To secure and maintain a complete exhibit of commercial ores, a mining library, covering all phases of mining, and the reduction of ores; and a bureau of information through which reliable information may be secured relative to the various mineral sections of the country, to the end that mining men may be assisted in the solution of those problems which often mean success or failure to their enterprises, and that investors may be better protected against all but the necessary risks of the mining business.

3. By uniting in one great organization those forces which should aid in giving direction to the evolution of the great mining industry through intelligent investigation, enlightened discussion, and unity of action.

AMALGAMATED PRODUDES WELL.

Last reports from the Amalgamated Copper company at Butte, Mont., shows a remarkable production of the red metal in that section. The management is stimulated to the highest efforts by the high price that prevails for copper throughout the country at the present time. It is said that the Washoe smelter is handling 7000 tons daily and the Great Falls 3500. The copper yield from the Washoe plant is 10,000,000 pounds of copper per month while the Great Falls is taking out \$7,000,000, making a total of 22,000,000 pounds for the big copper combine. This would make the annual production at the rate of 254,000,000 pounds.

The Amalgamated receives daily a by product from its copper ore of 800,000 ounces of silver and 300 ounces of gold, which would be at the rate of 9,600,000 ounces of silver a year and 3600 ounces of gold. If silver is given the average value that prevailed for some time, 58 cents an ounce, the Amalgamated is turning into markets of the world \$5,568,000 worth of the white metal a year and its gold product is \$22,000 for the same period.

COPPER WELDING PROCESS

Consul Shank of Winnipeg, Canada, reports that scientific circles are interested in the discovery of a process for welding copper which has been made by a local blacksmith. It is said the process has been thoroughly tested and found perfect and that copper can be welded to copper or to other metals without impairing the electrical conductivity and other properties of the metal. The process is said to be very simple and no more costly than the welding of steel. The work can be done with a forge, blow pipe, or any apparatus which will heat the metal cherry red. Patents have been applied for in the United States and Canada.—Pacific Miner.

The crop of turkeys in this proximity is said to be even larger than it was last year, and last year the Wells Fargo Express Company shipped out from this point over 15 tons. Meet us Chick Food.

In a recent report of experiments in feeding chicks the Idaho Island experiment station says:

"The use of the proper proportion of animal food will pay a handsome profit through decreased mortality and increased weight of the chicks."

"The experiment which led up to this conclusion was with an incubator hatch of 219 chicks. These were separated into lots of about fifty each and placed in similar brooders. For thirty days all conditions were kept alike except the rations. Pen A was fed a balanced ration of grains, meat and green food. The chicks grew and thrived, and not one chick showed symptoms of digestive disorder. The deaths amounted to 3.5 per cent. In pen B all animal food was withheld. The deaths were 9.5 per cent, of which 75 per cent had bowel trouble. Pen C was fed on grain alone, all animal food and all green food being omitted from the ration. The deaths were 22.7 per cent, of which 76.5 per cent showed digestive trouble. In pen D all grain food was omitted. The deaths of chicks were 63.7 per cent, of which 85.8 per cent showed bowel trouble. All the living chicks were weighed at the close of the test, and pen A showed the greatest average weight."

The Poultry Yard.

If there are any hollows in your poultry runs that are liable to hold water after heavy showers fill them up or drain so that the birds will not be compelled to wade through muddy water halfway up to their knees, so to speak, says Commercial Poultry. Otherwise some of those valuable and highly prized early hatched birds will likely lie down and die. And you will wonder what is the matter with them. They will be dead, of course, but you might have saved them.

Charcoal Prevents Disease.

The use of charcoal will prevent much of the diseases that affect the bowels of poultry. A teaspoonful of charcoal per fowl in the soft feed about three times a week will prove a great benefit to their health.—Farm and Live Stock Journal.
