

PRIZE ESSAYS

Here's Your Chance Young People.

The Oregon Society of the Sons of the American Revolution offers prizes to the pupils of the Public schools of the State of Oregon for essays connected with Revolutionary history. Prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 will be awarded to the best three essays in the order of merit, on either of the following subjects:

1. John Paul Jones.
2. Woman's Part in the Revolution.
3. The Commissary Department of the Revolutionary Army—compared with the present.

The essays are limited to 5,000 words, written in the student's own hand writing on one side of the paper. The essays must be accompanied by a certificate of the principal of the school attended by the writer, stating that the writer is a bona fide student of the school and has attended not less than four weeks during the school year of 1905-6. Each essay must be signed by the writer in his or her

consisting of a four horsepower gasoline engine and a small dynamo. With this his residence, cellar and barn are brilliantly lighted at a cost of only \$3 a month. The internal resources of the west are called to notice by the experience of the government in connection with the building of the irrigation dam on Salt River, for the Tonto Basin reclamation project. It was found that 220,000 barrels of cement would be required for the immense dam. As the dam is located 62 miles from a railroad, the question of cement was a serious one, but it was discovered that it was possible to make excellent cement at the dam site, and a mill was established at that point, which is now in operation. By adopting this plan over \$2,000,000 was saved in the cost of the improvement. So elsewhere throughout the west there are immense opportunities which only await the creation of a demand sufficient to justify capital in making the developments required to make the raw material available. The importance of this self sufficiency of the west is twofold—first, in the saving of high freight charges, and second in the creation of a home industry.

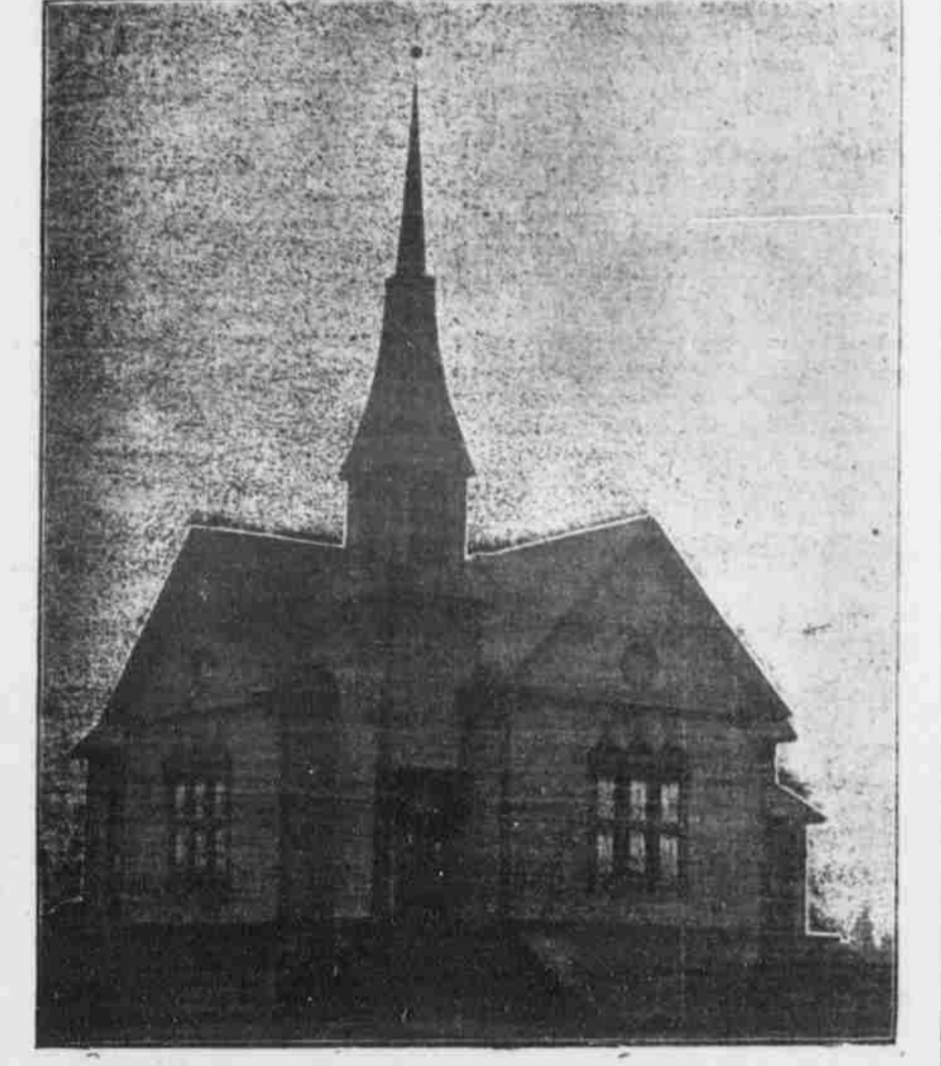

Safe Robbed.

Salem, Ore., Nov. 19.—The mysterious disappearance of a gold watch belonging to a convict at the Oregon penitentiary and the finding of a diamond ring, also the property of a convict, in the vest pocket of Roscoe James, son of Prison Superintendent C. W. James, will form the foundation of a demand for another investigation of that institution by the Marion county grand jury.

Both articles were taken from their owners at the time of imprisonment and were placed in the Superintendent's safe for keeping until the prisoners should be discharged. The ring, by a strange circumstance was discovered by its owner. The watch has not been found and Superintendent James has paid the owner its value out of his own pocket.

The ring was taken from Charles Walton, the Portland street-car robber, when he was brought to the penitentiary. Like all other valuables taken from prisoners, it was placed in an envelope, sealed, and with Walton's name written thereon placed in the safe. About six weeks ago Roscoe James sent a suit of clothes to the prison tailor shop to be pressed and Walton happened to be the prisoner who received this suit to work upon.

FINDS HIS OWN RING.
Feeling something in the pocket, Walton took it out and found it to be his own ring. Complaint was made to the officers and the ring was restored to the safe. The explanation made by young James was that he found the ring on the floor of the office and put it in his pocket, intending to give it to his father, but forgot it.

Superintendent James says he had the box of valuables out on the table the day the ring was alleged to have been picked up and on examination he finds a hole was worn in the corner of the envelope, so he concluded that the ring slipped out of the envelope and rolled upon the floor without being noticed. The explanation of the ring incident was satisfactory to him, and the matter was dropped.
