CO-OPERATION.

Co-operation is the product of machinery. Before the invention of pitchers and cups the members of the primitive family, if the family then existed, went individually to the spring to drink. After they had learned to hollow out a gourd, one person could carry water for several. In this case, as in millions of others, co-operation spells economy. The essential condition is the organized group of individuals; labor saving devices are the tools. The horde and the family were the first forms of co-operation. Out of the family in its several varieties, grew other forms of co-operation, social, political and industrial. In general, they fall into two classes, compulsory and voluntary, but the dividing line is not always distinct. The citizen is, by accident of birth, a member of the great co-operative society called the nation. The shareholder, of his own volition, becomes a part of that wonderfully facile co-operative mechanism called the corporation. The owner of real estate may, in spite of himself, be included in a co-operative society for the improvement of his own and other property.

Co-operation is the foundation on which civilization is built. Dwellers in cities cannot go individually fifty or 100 miles to the mountains every time when they want a drink. The city cannot be taken to the mountain, so the mountains are brought to the city in a pipe line. To do which requires co-operation of some kind.

In mining, as in other industries, co-operation is the form of economy out of which wealth is built. Most mines are developed and operated by corporations, and a corporation is a co-operative industrial commonwealth.

But co-operation in mining can, with profit, be carried further than the corporation. A mining district has splendid possibilities where the situation calls for compulsory co-operation.

With the possibilities of a live mining district, made real by the co-operation of not alone the companies or individuals, but that of every business man and property holder, there would be an increased market for the product of the soil, for the factory, merchandise sales would be increased, and there would be more work for men and women, instead of expecting the few companies that would, and will, in time, carrying more than one Oregon mining district into the realms of active development and production. Co-operation for thousands of dollars in the future, instead of a dollar a day plan, should be the battle cry of our progress.
