Mr. Foley had a rifle and 45 Colts Automatic Revolver. He took the revolver out and was showing the gun, and pointed it at various people, and while pointing it at Mr. Keizur pulled the trigger. Mr. Keizur had just raised his hand defensively when the bullet passed through his hand and his body just below his heart. He was brought to town on the O & S E in a record run, but was breathing his last when the train reached town. Mr. Keizur is an old man of 70 and lives with his wife above Willwood several miles. A son reached the station just as the train pulled into town.

Commercial Club

The meeting of the club Monday night was especially well attended, there being 27 members and two visitors present. Mr. Burkholder made a short speech on the Albany meeting, in which he spoke of the fact that in Mr. J. K. Weatherford's speech he stated that there was \$15,000,000 to be paid out in labor alone in getting out Linn county's timber, and that in 75 years a new growth would be ready for cutting. Mr. Stoltz of Salem, made a talk on drainage, and the increased value and amount of products raised on drained land. Mr. Campbell states that a meeting was set for Cottage Grove in the last of November or the first of December.
