JONES FISH POND.

J. I. Jones finished up the work on his monster "Fish Pond" on Tuesday and will fix it up so that it will fill up with the first rain. We all know that Mr. Jones is after some "big fish" to make their location at the pond and we trust that they will be able to make the proper deal.

With a pond the size of the one Mr. Jones has built there is room for a large quantity of logs to be stored, and space for the accommodation of a large sawmill. That such mills are bound to come to the town, is a fact that none will dispute. The east is searching the country over for timber, and more and more capitalists are coming to this country for timber. Elsewhere will be found an article about Oregon timber used in the Trans-Siberian railway. Our timber is shipped everywhere. We have lying close around Cottage Grove, in the territory so located that the timber must find its market through Cottage Grove alone, some 17,000,000,000 feet of standing timber. What vast sums this means will have to be paid out in labor to prepare for market is bewildering in its amount. When capital finds out what we have in the way of timber here, as it is coming to know better with each day, we will have a number of large mills running constantly. Ten mills, each cutting 100,000 feet of lumber each and every ten hours, or one million feet per day, could cut lumber at Cottage Grove for 45 years and still not use up all the timber closely adjacent to the town.

A BILL TO ESTABLISH A DEPARTMENT OF MINES AND MINING

BE it enacted by the senate and the house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled, that there shall be at the seat of government an executive department be known as the department of mines and mining, and a secretary of mines and mining at the head thereof, who shall be appointed by the president by and with the advice and consent of the senate, who shall have a seat in the cabinet, and who shall receive a salary of \$5000 per annum; and section 158 of the Revised Statutes is hereby amended to include such department, and the provisions of title 4 of the Revised Statutes, including all amendments thereto, are hereby made applicable to said department.

Sec. 2. That there shall be in said department an assistant secretary of mines and mining, to be appointed by the president, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, who shall receive a salary of \$4,000 per annum. He shall perform such duties as shall be prescribed by the secretary and required by law. There shall also be appointed by said secretary one chief clerk, who shall receive a salary of \$1800 per annum, and such other clerical assistance as may, from time to time, be authorized by Congress.

Sec. 3. That the said department of mines and mining shall have general jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to mines and mining industries and the geological survey and over all the matters committed to any of the bureaus, offices, departments, or branches of the public service by this act transferred from other executive departments of the government to the said department of mines and mining as fully as the same is now possessed by any of the said bureaus, offices, departments, or branches of the public service, from whence the same is so transferred, and that the official records and papers now on file in and relating to the business of any such bureau, office, department or branch of the public service in this act transferred to the department of mines and mining, together with the furniture now in use in such bureau, office, department or branch of the public service, shall be, and is hereby, transferred to the department of mines and mining.

Sec. 4. That there shall be in the department of mines and mining a bureau which shall, under the direction of the secretary thereof, gather, compile, and publish information in respect to the same, and it shall be the duty of said bureau which shall, under the direction of the secretary thereof, gather, compile, and publish information in respect to the same and it shall be the duty of said bureau to acquire and disseminate practical and useful information concerning the mines, mineral resources and mining industries of the United States; that the office of the director of the Geological survey service and all that relates to and pertains to the same is hereby transferred from the jurisdiction of the Interior department to the jurisdiction and supervision of the department of mines and mining, to remain henceforth under the jurisdiction of the latter; and the director of the geological survey is hereby made the director of said bureau.

Sec. 5. That the secretary of mines and mining shall annually make a report in writing to congress, which shall contain an account of all moneys received and expended by him in promoting and facilitating the development of the American mines, mineral resources and mining industries, and such recommendations as he shall deem necessary to the further development of the same. He shall also make special investigations and reports on particular subjects whenever required to do so by either the president, the senate or the house of representatives.

Sec. 6. That the secretary of mines and mining shall have charge in the building or premises occupied by or appropriated to the department of mines and mining of the library, furniture, pertaining to it, or hereafter acquired for use in its business; and he shall be allowed to expend for periodicals and the purposes of the library and for the rental of appropriate quarters for the accommodation of the department of mines and mining within the District of Columbia, and for all other incidental expenses such sums as congress may provide from time to time; provided, however, that where any bureau proposed to be transferred to the department of mines and mining by this act is occupying rented buildings or premises, they may still continue to do so until other suitable quarters are provided for their use; and provided further, that all officers, clerks and employees now employed in any of the bureaus, offices, departments,

or branches of the public service in this act transferred to the department of mines and mining are each and all hereby transferred to said department at their present grade and salaries, except where otherwise provided in this act, until otherwise provided by law. And provided further, that all laws prescribing the work and defining the duties of the several bureaus, offices, departments or branches of the public service by this act transferred to and made a part of the department of mines and mining shall, so far as the same are not in conflict with the provisions of this act, remain in full force and effect until otherwise provided by law.

Sec. 7. That the jurisdiction, supervision, and management and control of mines and mining lands and mining industries now vested in the Interior department are hereby transferred to and vested in the department of mines and mining. Referred to by Congressman C. D. Van Duzer of Nevada.

Kills Himself to Give Family Insurance.

Baker City, Ore., Feb. 5.—H. E. West, 30 years of age, a railroad man of La Grande who had been at Baker City the past few days out of work, became despondent last night and committed suicide at the Crabb hotel in this city by taking an overdose of morphine. He had a wife and family living at La Grande. West left a letter for his wife stating that he had nothing to live for and his dying would help the family by leaving insurance money to them. His wife arrived at Baker City this morning, prostrated by the shock. It is said their married life had always been of the most pleasant character. The coroner's jury at noon today returned a verdict of death by committing suicide from an overdose of morphine.

Hurd Lumber Co. Sells Its Interests.

Yesterday there was filed with the county clerk a deed transferring from the Hurd Lumber and Navigation Company of Florence all their extensive holdings to the Oregon & California Lumber Company. The deal includes a large quantity of land at Florence and Glenora, besides large acreage in other parts of the county.

The right granted to the Hurd company by the secretary of war to put in piling and booming on the Shoshaw river is specified as a part of the transfer.

The Hurd sawmill at Florence and the logging machinery of the company is included. The consideration named is the nominal sum of \$10.—Eugene Register.
