He says there are now 260 phones here, and that at the rate the board is filling up, there will soon be close to 400 or 500 phones, and that when such an amount as that is obtained that the company will doubtless put in a central energy system which is a great improvement over the present system, but is very expensive to install, as well as to maintain. Under that system, there is no crank to turn to ring up, as the receiver being lifted notifies central that you want a connection, as well as many other important improvements. We all wish, with the telephone company that enough subscribers may be obtained to warrant such a system being installed.

### A Day Current

Mr. Russell Welch, local manager of the electric plant here states that his brother, who is the general manager of the Willamette company will be here today to decide about certain changes that are to be made in the local plant.

A large steam engine which was the property of the Lane County Electric Company at Eugene has been shipped here, and will shortly be set up, together with a large dynamo from the Salem plant, and to which later will be added another dynamo of equal power from the Albany plant. The present engine and dynamo will be sent to Seaside, where a plant is being installed. It is the intention to have a day current by the first of June at the very least.
