A People's Man

M. Svarverud of Eugene, candidate for State Representative on the Republican ticket is essentially a man of the people's choice. He is a member of the Eugene Real Estate and Investment Co. and is interested in seeing all of Lane County progress as rapidly as possible and to that end is leading all his energies and will continue to do so if elected to represent Lane County in the State Legislature. Some of his strongest views are on the subject of the control of public utilities. He does not believe in the granting of perpetual franchises but believes that perpetual franchises should be repealed and limited ones substituted.

He does not believe any City charter should authorize city councils to grant perpetual franchises. He believes in the enactment of general laws and city charters which will authorize the people through the proper officials to fix reasonable maximum rates to be made by public utility corporations. He believes in the regulation of State and private banks under a law similar to the National Banking act, and will support such a law.

He believes that franchises are property and are subject to taxation and will support a measure designed to impose adequate taxes upon public utility franchises.

These questions are ones of moment throughout the whole great world, not along the United States, and everywhere the trend is towards regulation.

Allan Eaton, proprietor of Eaton's book store, of Eugene is a candidate for nomination as State Representative, on the Republican ticket and his petitions are being circulated throughout the county. Swamp reclamation is to command eastern attention, if the Hansbrough bill becomes a law. After it is on the statute books, it is the purpose to devote the funds derived from sale of all public lands in a given portion of the United States, to swamp work. It is estimated that there is 100,000,000 acres of such land, 70,000,000 of which has surveyed. Some of the swamps cover high as 300,000 and 400,000 acres and engineers believe that many such reclamation projects could be carried out on a mammoth scale for as low as \$10 and \$15 an acre. The land would be of undoubted fertility in most instances, perhaps among the richest soils of the country. If the bill becomes law, western men will endeavor to see that the swamp fund is derived from the states affected, and that the princely revenue now devoted to desert reclamation is kept intact for the west.

Senator Fulton expects soon to be forced into a struggle in the Senate, against repeal of the Timber & Stone act. It has been reported out of the committee on Public Lands and champions of this policy intend to get the bill to a vote if possible this session. Senator Fulton has gathered data showing the unappropriated land in Oregon to be about 20,000,000 acres, a considerable portion of which is timber and he is also ready to prove to the Senate that most Oregon timber land when at a moderate altitude is susceptible of more profitable uses than forestry. His figures show that if the Government allows the state only 10 per cent of the funds derived from timber sales and keeps all of the range leasing charge, Oregon will profit only at the rate of 2 or 3 cents an acre per year. With the support that is expected from Washington, also heavily timbered west of the Cascades, the Oregon senator hopes to have the domain of his state kept open to private entry and development.

An epiphany to an Oregon senator was paid by the Washington Post this week when speaking of the Senate leaders in the railway rate discussion. The leading Washington paper referred to Hon. C. W. Fulton as one of the modest young senators who had revealed his ability in a manner to win the cordial friendship of his colleagues.

There is some doubt about the adjournment being as early as May 10, which was the time fixed earlier. The protracted debate in the Senate on the preliminaries of the great measure it is now considering, is taken to indicate a greater consumption of time when the numerous amendments and substitutes are taken up one at a time for disposition.
