



The man who conceived, planned and constructed Luna Park, the greatest, most dazzling and most successful of all the amusement places of New York, had nerve.

Nerve is that quality in a man which can go up against adversity, grip it with bulldog determination, and hang on like grim death.

Nerve is what stands by a man when his friends leave him alone; business is going to the devil in spite of him.

The other day a prominent young business man, closely identified with Kansas affairs, and possessed of a happy home, substantial banking and splendid prospects, was found dead in a hotel with a bullet hole through his head. This man had been going ill with fits in recent ways, and he had lost his nerve.

When you see a big factory or a big store, which has started with nothing and grown to maturity and power, you are very likely to conclude that the proprietor must have been a man of business ability. 
