A special train of 3 cars carrying E. H. Harriman, president of the S. P. Company and other officials passed through here Sunday on their way north from San Francisco. Mr. Harriman is devoting his personal time to the work of superintending the rebuilding of the S. P. lines to San Francisco and the work of relief and returned going south Tuesday noon.

The Willamette Valley Co. has put out a new water rate card in Eugene, by which any family up to five persons can have the privilege of water for house use, bath and toilet for \$1 per month. For a family of over five persons an additional charge is made. The rate certainly is very low. The irrigation rate is 1/4 cent per square yard, which is causing some comment.

The Government has for years given out packages of seed grown under the most careful condition and has through its Agricultural department done much to establish new growths of seeds, plants, fruits and grains. This practice will probably be discontinued with this year as strong opposition has been worked up against this work of the government.

Each watch movement requires from 30 to 50 screws. By the earlier methods a skilled workman could make 800 to 1,200 screws daily. Automatic machines now produce from 4,000 to 10,000 screws per day, and one man can operate six machines.

The units of weights and measure in the United States are practically those used in the colonies prior to the formation of our government. While congress has never definitely authorized the weights and measures in common use, it has sanctioned their use by its act of June 14, 1836, providing that accurate copies of the yard, pound, etc., be furnished as standards to each state.

It is estimated that the railroads of the United States spend annually \$15,000,000 in additional fuel and boiler repairs due to the hard and muddy water used for making steam. Using hard water in boilers is much more expensive than softening it, since on the average 1,000 gallons of hard water will do 50 cents' worth of damage in fuel and repairs, while 1,000 gallons of hard water may almost always be softened at not more than 5 cents.

The Cottage Grove creamery is delayed in getting its ice cream machinery through the San Francisco fire and has had to borrow some from the Hazelwood people until more can be ordered from the east for them. They will soon be in shape to handle all kinds of trade. Mr. Stiller informs us that he is making from 400 to 500 pounds of butter per week and that next week he will commence making at least 600 pounds as he has eight new customers that commence then. While the trade is not as good now as a short time ago, many more people are sending in cream daily, and are getting more cows, so the supply grows.
