Sunday School Convention Held at Creswell.

The 17th annual convention of the Lane County Sunday School Association was held at Creswell, April 25 and 26. At 3 p. m. Wednesday, the convention was called to order by the president Mrs. M. D. Mitchell, in the Methodist church.

The opening service of prayer and song was led by M. J. Hillegas of Creswell.

Rev. Stafford gave the delegates a hearty welcome which was responded to by Mrs. Randolph of Coburg.

Mr. Wm. Pitney, secretary of the county association, being absent, the president appointed J. M. Day to fill the vacancy.

After the reading of the minutes 1905 convention, came the reports of the Sunday schools of the county.

That these questions are of vital importance in Sunday school work was shown by the rapid attention given to these two speakers of the convention.

Pitney of Junction City, who has been the able secretary of the county association for so many years and the prayers of the convention were asked that he might recover his wanted health that we might have the benefit of his counsel for many years to come.

The song service led by W. Wheeler of Pleasant Hill, and Mr. Marton of Creswell, were very helpful in the work of the convention.
