We have on hand at this office for distribution a number of packages of fine seeds, furnished by the United States Government through the courtesy of Hon. Senator Gearin. Any one who desires such seeds may call at this office and they will be given a package. The Government has for years given out packages of seed grown under the most careful condition and has through its Agricultural department done much to establish new growths of seeds, plants, fruits and grains. This practice will probably be discontinued with this year as strong opposition has been worked up against this work of the government.

Though the demand for pins the world over is enormous, the mills of the United States practically supply the entire demand. Formerly pins were expensive, but now they cost a mere trifle. In 1905 the 75,000,000 people in the United States used 60,000,000 gross of pins which is equal to 9,500,000,000 pins or an average of about 126 pins for every man, woman and child in the country. This is the highest average reached anywhere in the use of pins. The years ago we used only about 72 pins each. The total number of pins manufactured in the United States during 1900, the census year, was 68,889,260 gross. There are 43 factories in all, with 2,353 employees. The business has grown rapidly during the last 20 years, for although there were 40 factories in 1880 they produced only half as much, employed only about half the capital and only 1,077 hands.

New Machinery For Doctor Mine.

The Eugene Guard states that a quantity of machinery has arrived there for transportation to the "Doctor" mine, owned by Dr. Candiani, the Italian Consul at Portland. The machinery includes an air drill and compressor of the latest pattern. It is expected to transport the machinery as soon as the difficulty over the Lucky Boy road is settled so that the road is opened.

A 350-foot cross cut tunnel is being run at the 400-foot depth, and as soon as the ore is opened up a good sized stamp mill will be installed, and another producer will be added to the district.

The mines have done much development work in the past but recently has been tied up in litigation, until recently when the "Doctor" won out and the work will now be kept up in earnest. All the lumber and timbers for the mine are furnished by a sawmill on the property.

P. V. Cooper, who has been secretary of W. B. Dennis, manager of the Black Butte mine, was appointed Assistant manager of the mine last week by Mr. Dennis.

Mr. Cooper is a young man and started in as office boy and has in five years worked himself up to his present position and has a bright future before him. He has won his promotion by steady hard work, and intends to keep up the pace.

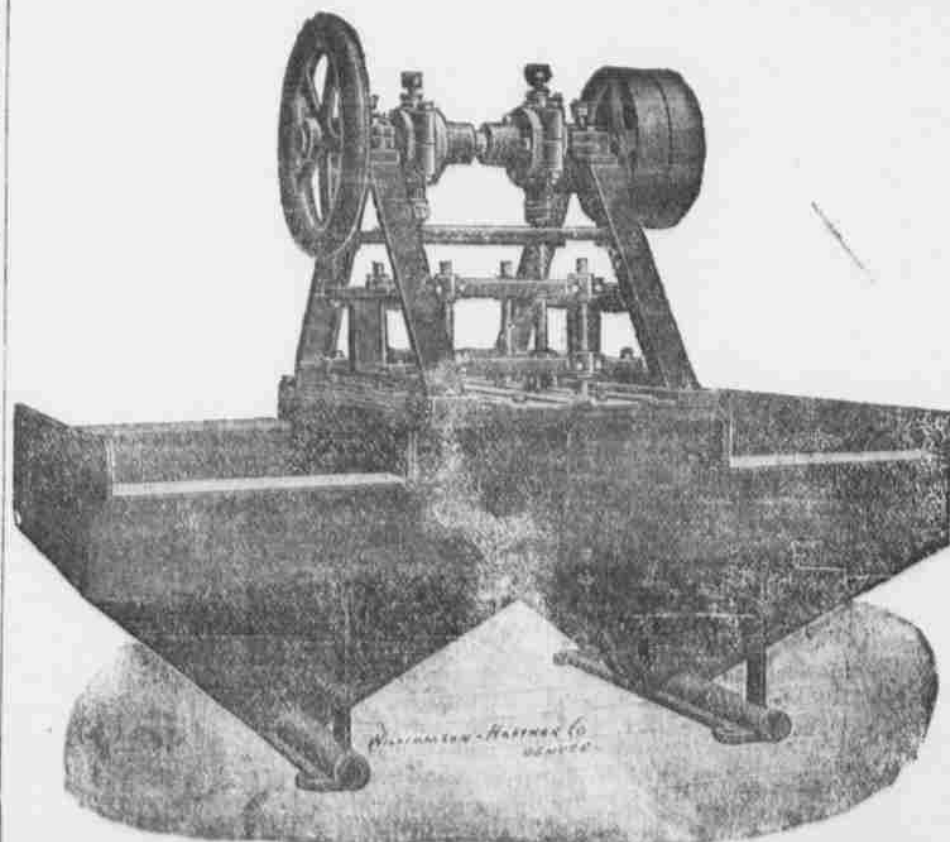
