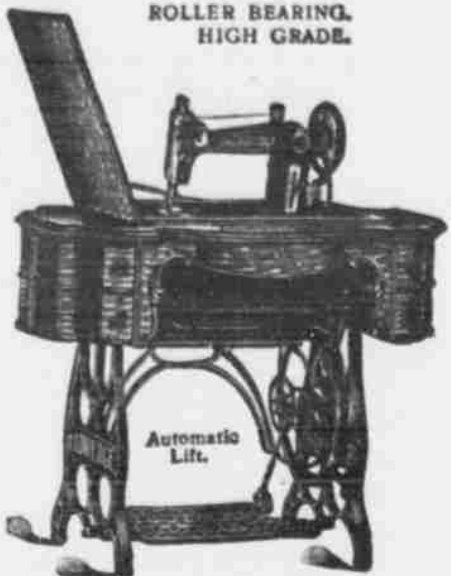

there until six o'clock, making our way to Drain where we were captured.

The second boy being called said his name was Hugh Saxon, aged 16, born in Pine Bluff, Ark. and lived 15 years in Texas, but had been working last for the Portland Iron works. When asked if he would make any statement he stated that he would make the same statement as the other boy, then when told that he could waive making a statement said he would not make any.

The statement being signed, the justice stated that under the statute he could not do other than bind them over to the circuit court without bonds.

They were taken to the county jail by Sheriff Fisk on the noon train.

In a talk with one of the boys he stated that for years he had been reading all his spare time, dime novels, and that his mind had gotten so filled with their stories that it started him and his companion likewise on their career of crime. He said "I have sat up whole nights reading cheap detective stories. I wish there had never been such books printed."

The confession made by the eldest boy is a remarkable one. There is a clear, concise statement from the time of the crime until their capture, all unnecessary words eliminated, little to vary from, a carefully prepared tale, the like of which would be a hard thing for any man to figure out under the circumstances.

The death of the old man, after having served his country's flag for four and a half years at the risk of his life, to lose his life at the hands of two hoodlums, with whom he classed his four sons, saying "I have four sons in San Francisco, just such hoodlums as the two boys who shot me" is sad indeed. True it reflects upon himself that he should have such a worthless family, but the fearful condition is the same. Murdered, possibly without a realization of their crime, by two boys who wanted his meat, or as they stated because he started to draw a knife, which the examination of his effects showed he did not have.

The statement of Marshal Underwood before the Coroner's jury that he had been instructed by his superior officers that men have a right to carry a weapon in a scabbard or holster and that for that reason he did not disarm the boys when he held them up, is one that deserves attention. If he had disarmed the boys the crime would not have been committed, they had already threatened persons with their guns, they carried them in scabbards underneath their coats, and consequently concealed. The law prohibits persons carrying concealed weapons, so why should weapons even if carried in scabbards, not come under the same law. A grave charge must lie before those who issued such an order. A weapon is concealed, whether it is, or is not in a scabbard and is still out of sight. If this condition continues under such rash attacks and losses of life will occur and it is time officials gave the marshal other instructions.
