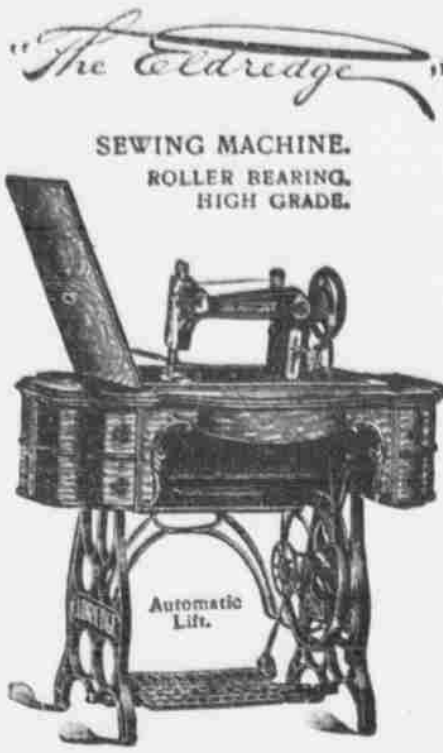

NOTE—The interest and discount item also includes a considerable amount of interest accrued prior to March 24th, 1905. The net value of the accumulated concentrates (which are to be shipped to the smelter for treatment) is estimated at \$4,049.53. This sum should therefore be taken into consideration, together with the amount of the returns on the free milling ore, as representing (with the exception of a small amount earned during the preliminary run of the mill prior to the midsummer dry season of 1905), the company's production during the past nine months. As against this, it should be borne in mind that the expense of operation, as set forth above covers a much longer period.

We beg to advise you that the financial affairs of the company have now been put in such shape as to immeasurably strengthen and safeguard its position in every way. A preliminary move toward this end was made in August, 1905, when the entire indebtedness, amounting to \$285,000 (including the sum required to carry to completion the immediate plans for development), was funded for a period of two years. This was accom-

plished through the efforts of some of the directors, who, as the stockholders are aware, had practically been carrying the burden of the company's debt, by endorsing the short time notes representing same. Realizing, however, that while this arrangement was a step in the right direction, it was not without its drawbacks, we finally resolved upon a measure whereby the matter would be adjusted to the satisfaction of all interested in seeing the affairs of this organization brought to a successful outcome. By this action, taken last April, the company was authorized to make an issue of \$400,000 of ten year six per cent sinking funds gold bonds, \$300,000 of which now covers the total indebtedness, plus accrued interest, etc. These latter bonds were purchased by certain directors, who are also the largest stockholders of the company. The remaining \$100,000 of the bonds are held in the treasury for future improvements, enlargement to plant, etc., and will probably not be offered for some time. If they are disposed of, it will be to provide the company with funds that may be required to consummate its plans for large development.

The manifold advantages to be derived by the company as a result of this measure can be seen at a glance. Whereas under the former conditions, the time covered would have expired in a little over a year from date, the debt is now practically funded for ten years, as the sinking fund proviso calls for the payment of but 2 1/2 per cent per annum toward the retirement of the bonds. This naturally paves the way for the resumption of dividends just as soon as the earnings are sufficient to provide for the accumulation of a reasonable surplus.

In order to correct a somewhat general impression we desire to state that the only salaries paid by the company are in compensation for clerical work and for labor at the mines.

There are now no suits pending, in which the company is involved. The executive committee have just returned from the Bohemia District, having made an extended and careful examination of the mines. They express themselves as being greatly pleased with conditions as they found them at the properties.
