of the mining business.

Third—By bringing about an intelligent revision and unification of the mining laws through which practical mining operations may not be hindered by unnecessary restrictions and that every facility for mining operations may be created and that protection against fraudulent mining and promotion operations may be provided for the investor to the end that greater mineral production may be brought about by that stimulation in mining investments which will come through proper assurances of fair dealing.

Fourth—By uniting in one great organization those forces which have produced the mineral wealth of the country, for mutual discussion, investigation and action.

DEPARTMENT OF MINES AND MINING.

The agitation for an independent Department of Mines and Mining, with its head a member of the President's cabinet, is rapidly gaining ground and the feeling that this, perhaps the greatest of all American industries has not received at the hands of the Federal Government attention commensurate with its importance is growing. The United States is more deeply indebted to the mining industry for her commercial supremacy and financial independence than any other industry, the prestige which is hers has been given her principally by her miners. What the Department of Agricultural interests of the United States, so will the Department of Mines and Mining be to the mining industry.

MINING LEGISLATION.

The necessity for a revision of some of the mining laws of the western states is gradually becoming more apparent. A concerted plan of action on the part of those interested seems to suggest itself as being the only feasible method of obtaining an improvement.

Upon two matters of legislation it is hoped that final action may be taken at this session of the Congress. A committee appointed for that purpose will report for approval the draft of a law providing for the creation of mine drainage districts similar to public improvement districts in cities and towns. Another committee will report for action the draft of a law for the protection of investors against fraudulent operations. Should final action be taken in these matters, these drafts will be presented to the various state legislatures at their next sessions and this organization will use its influence to bring about their enactment.

PROGRAM.

Papers upon practical subjects of importance to the mining world will be presented by authorities in their various lines. Drafts of the proposed law will be printed and distributed among delegates and members before the session, and certain time set aside for discussion of the subjects thus presented, to the end that full discussion, after a careful study of the proposed laws, will bring about a consensus of opinion and that a definite course of action may thus be adopted.

ENTERTAINMENT.

It is expected that the convention will devote itself to the work of arriving at a consensus of opinion as to what action will bring about the greatest development of the mining industry, and that it will not permit its sessions to be disturbed by any matters of local entertainment. Soon to Rural Telephone Users.

Dave Griggs is in receipt of a letter of advice stating that the United States Weather Bureau in co-operation with the Pacific States Telephone Co. proposes to furnish weather forecast covering the period from 5 p. m. of the day issued to 5 p. m. of the following day. These reports will be telephoned to the general central in each town, and when any rural subscribers ask for such weather forecast, they will be given them.

By this wise provision of the company it is possible for any farmer having a phone to know each day what the government weather forecast for the next day will be by simply calling up central. This will be a great thing for the farmers, as the establishment of the weather bureau has saved the farmers all over the U. S. many millions of dollars, by forestalling rains, heavy storms, frosts, etc.

BOOM IN SHEEP.

They Will Be as Scarce as Lamb in a Year.

"As the summer progresses the fact becomes evident that eastern woolgrowers must prepare themselves to take chances during the approaching marketing season," says the Brookfield Gazette, Chicago. "There will be no large number of sheep at market or on the range. Nothing has yet been offered to test demand, but the latter seems in acute form. Chicago commission men already have orders for several hundred thousand feeding lambs, and at Omaha they are also filled. Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and New York are already manufacturing lambs, while territory supplied by Canada is equally dimensioned. Indications point to a speculative market around 50 per hundredweight, and at that figure the east will not be able to supply the demand. It is expected that the stock will be available at \$6. A year ago there was an expectation of a \$10 market on good feeding lambs, but now it is out at \$10.50, and at that price. That the range breeder will be a little disappointed at his price is evident, and, what is more, the breeder and the speculator will keep the market this year.

"Feeders in the west may as well make up their minds now that they are not to get anything cheap. There will be enough lambs to go round at the price, but there will be as many as look to a better trading. It is possible that speculative demand or a better regulation of supply next winter will result in higher average prices and more satisfactory profits to the farmer. But raw material will not be available in such abundance. There are thousands of acres of land to be fenced and prices will not show indications of the low tide."

DENATURED ALCOHOL.

Conditions Under Which It is to Be Manufactured.

Jan. 1, 1907, the new "free alcohol" law became effective, and farmers are now authorized to distill their own corn, wheat or other grain into alcohol for use on their own farms. The law provides that the alcohol so distilled shall be used for the purpose and under the direction of an authorized government officer, after withdrawal from the distillery warehouse, with methyl alcohol or other suitable material suitable for the use for which the alcohol is withdrawn, and which destroys its character as a beverage and renders it unfit for liquid medicinal purposes and adaptation to be used upon the application of any registered distillery or distiller. The law also provides that the alcohol so distilled shall be used for the purpose and under the direction of an authorized government officer, after withdrawal from the distillery warehouse, with methyl alcohol or other suitable material suitable for the use for which the alcohol is withdrawn, and which destroys its character as a beverage and renders it unfit for liquid medicinal purposes and adaptation to be used upon the application of any registered distillery or distiller.
