Henry Pearson and wife left for the south Monday afternoon. Mr. Pearson has the honor of being one of the first discoverers of the Bohemia camp.  
 The first rails have been laid on the Drain-Coos bay road, so that the steam shovels can get to work on several big cuts. They expect to do considerable work of this kind before spring.  
 The Drain Nonpariel states that water was turned into the new water system for the first time last week and it worked like a charm. The pressure is received from 200 feet fall from the source of supply.  
 Some of the crossings on Main street are sadly in need of repair, and will not suffer much if a few extra heavy plank are put down. Those crossing Third street are the worst of all and should receive immediate attention.  
 There is being more development done in the Baker City district this year than ever before and with the prospect of a railroad being built into camp in the spring, the mines are making great preparations. One or two companies are building their own lines of railroad to connect with the line so as to be ready whenever it gets to them.  
 Two small boys near Elkton got hold of some 50 pounds of dynamite from the railroad builders and hid it under their bed. Sunday evening a week ago a lamp was overturned in the house and the parents were attempting to put out the blaze not knowing of the powder when the explosion occurred. Fortunately no one was hurt much, although Mr. Cheever, the father, was blown through the roof into a field several rods away.—Nonpariel!
