The Alumni association of the University of Oregon in Eugene is not going to sit idly by and see the referendum invoked against the university appropriation and a meeting has been called for the purpose of forming an organization which could work effectively. A committee was appointed to co-operate with the Portland Alumni association. The committee is composed of Alfred Cleveland, Judge E. O. Potter, Hon. A. C. Woodcock, Judge L. T. Harris, W. B. Dillard, L. L. Goodrich and R. S. Bryson.

The object of the meeting is to authorize a committee to get together statistics concerning the appropriation and the needs of the university which will counteract any misleading statements.—Register.

Commission After Details of Car Shortage.

To obtain accurate information regarding delays in obtaining cars and the movement of freight, the Oregon Railway commission has sent out postal card blanks to shippers, requesting replies to detailed questions. The Portland chamber of commerce is mailing the cards with a letter to their members. This is the first formal action taken in Oregon looking to enforcement of the new reciprocal demurrage law. The railway commission wants from the shipper information as to date when cars were applied for, name of the carrier to which application was made and kind and number of cars asked for, also the destination to which shipment was intended.

The shipper is asked to give the complete result of his application, the date when the cars were furnished (if at all), how and when they were set on the siding, number and initials of the cars, the date when they were loaded by the shipper and the date when they were moved out by the railroad company. The consignee is asked to state when the shipment was received.

With definite information on a number of cases of failure to furnish cars, and the delays incident to movement of freight within the state, the commission will be in a position to insist upon the material expediting of shipments and general improvement of the situation. The commission men will probably be the first to respond to the commissioner's action and in supporting any policy that will spur the railroad freight traffic and operating departments to prompt service.—Journal.
