

HINTS FOR FARMERS

Treatment For Quittor.
The veterinary of the Atlanta Constitution prescribes the following treatment for quittor of foot in horses and mules: Clean the foot and put it into a cloth boot containing bran poultice for several days, changing the poultice daily; then remove by paring with a sharp knife any edges of hoof that may be pressing on the sore place; then probe the opening or fissure to find its depth and direction. Take a grain of bichloride of mercury, roll it up in a piece of tissue paper and press it down into each opening. Put the foot in a bag to protect it from soil and let it alone for three days; then clean out the openings and repeat the bichloride of mercury, and so on for two weeks or until the parts become healthy; then make up a footbath of one ounce of chloride of zinc dissolved in one gallon of water. Put the foot in the bath twice a day for twenty minutes at a time. So soon as the fissures have healed blister the cornet by rubbing in an ointment of two drams of cantharides and one ounce of lard and repeat in two weeks if necessary. When cured put on a bar shoe for some time.

Clean Your Currants.
With a little flour put as many currants as required into a paper bag. After shaking them well empty them into a colander. Rub them well, and you will find they will be clean and dry in a few minutes. By this process the full flavor of the currants is retained.

Wants Uncle Sam to Build an Ariel Fleet of War Ships.

Inventors of airships and dirigible balloons are besieging the signal Corps of the War Department. Dozens of plans, drawings and models have been offered by aspiring inventors, each of whom believes his own idea of ariel navigation is the best. If Uncle Sam would attempt to build an ariel fleet he certainly will not lack for suggestions. However, Brigadier General James Allen, Chief of the Signal Corps, declares that none of the types submitted, is in any sense practicable. Furthermore the War Department is not empowered to expend any money in experimenting with the science of ariel navigation, except in so far as the regular military balloon service of the army is concerned. In the near future, General Allen says, the War Department hopes to erect at Fort Omaha, near Omaha, Neb., where most of the experiments are carried on, a plant for the manufacture of hydrogen gas. At the present time the Signal Corps is compelled to purchase its gas at Eastern points and ship it to the Missouri river.
