That Lorane Wild Man.

Mr. Hardy Crow of Lorane, Ore., called at the Nugget office and gave an interesting and accurate report of the burglar that has so bothered the Lorane people.

The man was first seen about January 1, going from house to house begging for food. His first appearance to cause alarm was at Mrs. Powell's home where he demanded something to eat. The mother being away teaching school the children were badly frightened. The people prevailed upon the man to go away, but he came back often still begging, always in the evening. On March 1, he went to Richard Crow's home and after taking some bread and fruit he stole a gun and a knife and searched the drawers of the bureau and the clock for money. Constable Crow and a party of four men went in search of him, looking in and watching all the cabins.

They found him in the Gibson cabin. He escaped from there and was next heard of near John Addison's farm, having stolen some meat from the smoke house on that place.

The search party followed and was informed by Mr. Conant that his children had seen the man in the vacant Smizer cabin not far from Conant's farm.

The constable, making sure he was in the cabin, surrounded the place and ordered the man to come out and give himself up. The man replied that he would not and said directly to the constable, who was nearest the cabin, "I'll fix you." A moment later he peered around the corner of the cabin, his gun raised ready to shoot. The posse seeing his intention, immediately opened fire, and he re-entered the house.

However, he escaped again and owing to the dense bushes and rough ground they were unable to track him. Later they got word from Mr. Gray that his smoke house had been broken into and the search party went hence. Two men were stationed at the Gibson cabin and while the majority of the party were at Grays, he came to this cabin. Melvil Fenwick, one of the men stationed there attempted to capture him and after inflicting a wound, which they thought to be fatal he went back of the cabin, having reason to think there were more than one man in the vicinity. The wound proved to be slight and the burglar escaped through the window, which was found out later by the search party and nothing has been heard of him since.

It is the prevailing opinion of the Lorane people that there are other men implicated with this man and intend to keep a sharp lookout for any one of them.

DEBATERS LEAVE FOR SALT LAKE

University of Oregon Representatives
are F. V. Galloway and J. C. Veatch

The debaters who will represent the University of Oregon in the interstate debate-championship of the Rocky Mountain region and the Pacific Northwest with the University of Utah, left for Salt Lake Saturday. The two men are F. V. Galloway of McMinnville, and J. C. Veatch of Cottage Grove. The former was leader of the negative team in the tri-state league and the latter of the affirmative team.

The debate which the men will take part in on April 26, will be probably one of the most important ever held on the Pacific coast, for the reason that both institutions which the teams represent are champions of the respective sections.

The question will be exactly the same as debated with Washington and Idaho, the repeal of the fifteenth, and a clause of the fourteenth amendments. While Oregon won on both sides of the question, it is generally considered that the side—the negative—adverse to the repeal, is the strongest and that side Oregon will have in this debate.

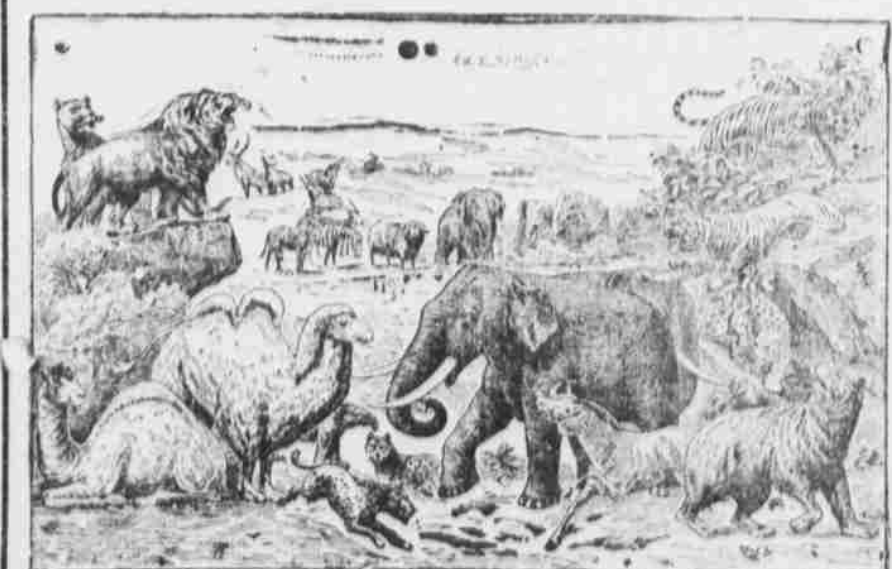
