

CHANGES IN SCHOOL LAW

New Regulations in Oregon go into Effect on May 25th.

There are a number of changes in the new state school law of Oregon which goes into effect May 25. These changes are of interest to all teachers and parents. The following are some extracts from the new law:

- 1. Only one second and one third grade certificate can be secured in the state.
2. Mental arithmetic has been dropped from all examinations for county papers.
3. After February first, 1908, all applicants for first grade must be examined in Literature and Physical Geography.
4. It shall be the duty of the state board of education to indicate at least one year before examination for certificate, the source or sources from which at least sixty per cent of the questions in Theory and Practice will be selected.
5. Teachers or the principal shall make monthly reports showing registration, attendance, tardiness and such other information as required on the blanks furnished by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.
6. The school superintendent shall require teachers, before beginning to teach in any school district in his county, to register all diplomas and certificates not previously registered in his county and file a copy of the contract. Should any teacher fail to register diploma or certificate or file contract said teacher shall forfeit the full amount of salary for the time already taught. Should any school board fail to enforce such forfeiture the county school superintendent shall deduct said amount from the next apportionment of county school funds due said district.
7. The clerk shall refuse to draw an order for the teacher's wages for the last month until the teacher's register shall have been completely filled out, filed and approved by the clerk.
8. Eighty-five per cent of the county and state funds shall be paid to the teacher.
9. The county court is compelled to levy seven dollars per capita.
10. The annual census shall be taken the last week in November.
11. All school districts must secure a flag and keep it flying at or near the school house on all favorable days.
12. All districts must have at least four months school during the year.
13. Two or more school districts may be united for the purpose of establishing and carrying on high schools or grades above the eighth. Such schools are known as union high schools and will in no way effect the present organization of the district or the first eight grades.
14. School officers' convention or conventions may be held once a year. This convention may include the entire county or the county may be divided into districts. The chairman of the board is made the delegate but in case he cannot attend, he must appoint some member of his board. Each delegate receives two dollars a day provided he attends the entire session of the convention.
15. Compulsory education law. All children between the ages of 9 and 14 years must attend school for the entire time school is in session in the district. All children between the ages of 14 and 16 must go to school or be engaged in some occupation, according to the provisions of the child labor law. Exceptions to these requirements are children in private schools, pupils physically unable to attend, pupils of 10 living more than one and one-half miles from school, pupils of any age living more than three miles from school and pupils under private tutors at home.

REFERENDUM COSTLY

Each Measure Submitted Means an Expenditure of \$25,000.

Salem, Or., April 15.—When the people of Oregon come to realize that it is going to cost between \$20,000 and \$25,000 for the satisfaction of exercising their right of suffrage upon just one question of general legislation, it is very doubtful if they will display such haste in petitioning for this privilege, under the initiative and referendum clause of the Constitution.

There are many changes in the process of submitting questions of legislation to the people under the new law, over the old, principal among which, from a financial standpoint, is that which requires the Secretary of State to mail each legal voter of the state a copy of the measure upon which the initiative and referendum has been invoked, in pamphlet form, together with printed copies of such arguments for and against the passage of such measures as may be advanced by the chief interests concerned. The expense of postage alone, for complying with this additional requirement, for mailing such information to over 100,000 legal voters, will amount to over \$3000. The postage, however, is but a small item when compared with printing and addressing envelopes, writing and printing the circular letters and distributing them, which are figured at not less than \$3000; cost of paper, printing and binding of proposed laws in pamphlet form, \$7000; publication of proclamations, \$5000. These estimates do not include the cost of printing and binding arguments, pro and con, concerning the measure or measures that are to be submitted, which is to be paid by the individual or association advancing the same, but to be sent out by the Secretary of State, which will not be less than \$5000 more.

U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Bulletin 74, "Statistics of Forest Products of the United States; 1905," by R. S. Kellogg and H. M. Hale, can now be obtained.

A discussion of the lumber output forms the chief part of the bulletin. Statistics on the production of cross ties, tight coeprage stock, pulpwood, mine timbers, tanbark, veneer, wood used for distillation, and the production of lath and shingles are also included. This is the first detailed report on wood products of the United States ever published. Accurate knowledge of the annual drain upon our forests is highly important for lumbermen, timber land owners, and the general public.

This bulletin is obtainable only by purchase from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. Remittances should be sent directly to him and must be by money order (stamps not accepted), or by coin at the remitter's risk. Money orders should be made payable to "Superintendent of Documents,"

who is the only government official authorized to sell the publications of the Forest Service. Remittances to the order of the Forester must be returned to the sender. The price of the bulletin is 15 cents.

OREGON'S "BIG STICK."

The Story of the Initiative and Referendum.

Can't Veto Laws Enacted by Initiative

Salem, Or., April 18.—Attorney-General Crawford in an opinion to settle a question raised by Deputy District Attorney John M. Court, of Pendleton, interprets the opinion of Justice Bean, of the Supreme Court, in the case of Kaddyler vs. Portland, declaring the veto-power of the governor applies only to acts passed by the legislature, and does not extend to initiative measures adopted by the people.
