The long trial and final acquittal of Binger Hermann calls to mind an injustice that is hard to correct. In prosecuting this man the government spent probably \$25,000 and it is perfectly right that sufficient money should be used to uncover every stone that might hide a conviction. But on the other hand what is to be done with the defendant? He was compelled to spend large sums of money to prove his innocence and it is right that he should have and spend every dollar necessary to a full and complete defense, but this expense in itself is a severe punishment. This is not right. If a state drags a man into court and fails to prove its case, then the state should pay every dollar of legitimate expense that man has been put to in proving his innocence. This is true, however, in all criminal cases, and the government is not the only one that is remiss. The same principle holds good down through the state and city courts to the most inconsiderate offender. At present, if a man is charged with a crime, no matter how innocent he may be, he is forced to spend money for lawyer's fees and to collect testimony to prove his innocence, and in this he is punished, even though the jury does clear him of the charge. Many an unfortunate has lost all he had in just such a manner and it is not right. The state should reimburse him if he is innocent.

A great many people who have favored Government ownership of railroads are hesitating now. They see the spectacle of great through lines of railroad, which have been managed with consummate ability, now in the midst of apparently great prosperity, half stranded and their managers at their wit's ends what to do to meet the traffic that presses upon them and at the same time keep their roads in working order. Looking at this and then thinking what the ordinary state Legislature would do, or even what Congress would do, thinking men recoil before the prospect. "But" says one, "those railroad sharps manipulate stocks; they are not fair to stockholders; they discriminate against towns and firms and individuals." Probably yes, at least some of them, but a firm execution of the laws would stop all those things, and would they be cured under Government ownership?

Electing men to high office does not change their nature. And with the best intentions some high officers make but a sorry showing when given some great work to perform which is out of their sphere. For instance, the work of the Panama Canal has not been, so far, an unqualified success. Suppose that were interposed in the

path of a road that Jim Hill or Mr. Harriman was building, and they had ample funds to put it through, does anyone think they would not make a better showing than has thus far been made on the Isthmus? In our time we have met very few men who did not believe that they were entirely competent to run a newspaper on advanced lines, eliminating present objections, or to superintend the opening and working of a great mine. So to the ordinary mortal it looks easy to run a railroad. But generally a State Legislature or Congress itself has always enough idiots and grafters to neutralize honest and capable work proposed even in simple things. Give them a continental railroad to handle and it would not be a year until men would be praying for ballons. Then the inevitable centralization of power in federal hands would be equal to a daily prophecy of the destruction of the Republic.—Salt Lake News.

An illustration of the great increase in cost of constructing irrigation canals and structures in the west and the difficulty the Government is experiencing in securing reasonable prices was furnished when bids were opened at Klamath Falls for the excavation of the Keno canal. This contract, which involved the excavation of 80,000 cubic yards of earth and rock, was advertised for more than two months, but only one bid was received—that of Paquet Gleibisch & Joplin of Portland, for \$62,829.

An analysis of this bid showed that the contractor was asking 75 cents per cubic yard for earth excavation. Less than nine months ago the Government let a contract for work of this character at less than 10 cents per cubic yard and out of 14 bids received, 18 cents was the highest amount asked.


On the ground that the bid of the Portland firm was excessive, the Secretary of the Interior rejected it and authorized the Reclamation Service to do the work by force account. It is probable that by subdividing the contract it can be let to individuals residing in the vicinity of the project.

A canal from Eugene via Monroe to a junction with the Long Tom in Benton county, and thence through the Long Tom and Willamette to Corvallis, the present head of regular steamboat navigation, is one of the plans proposed.
