

RESERVES MAY BE INVALID.

of the president have run against a condition which if the test is attempted, may invalidate the entire agricultural appropriation bill. It seems that President Roosevelt did not sign the bill until 9 o'clock Monday morning, March 4. He took the pains of making the date clear and of putting the time down 9:43 a. m. He evidently did this so as to make it clear that he did not sign the bill until after the proclamation creating the desired forest reserves had been issued. Now it is said he may have invalidated the entire bill, as the congress adjourned on the legislative day of March 2. It is argued that, on the afternoon of March 4 the new congress came into existence and the newly elected members began to draw their pay and the old members, whose term expired, ceased to draw pay. Hence it may be urged that, constructively, the date of March 4 belongs to the new congress and not to the old one and that a bill could not bear date of March 4 and be valid when the old congress adjourned on the legislative day of March 2.

It is said there is no exact precedent for the situation thus developed. The nearest approach to it is back in the Lincoln administration, when Lincoln signed the bill known as the capture and abandoned property act ten days after the adjournment of the congress and so indicated in affixing his signature. That bill stood the test of the court of claims but never was tested in the United States Supreme court.—Umpqua Valley News.

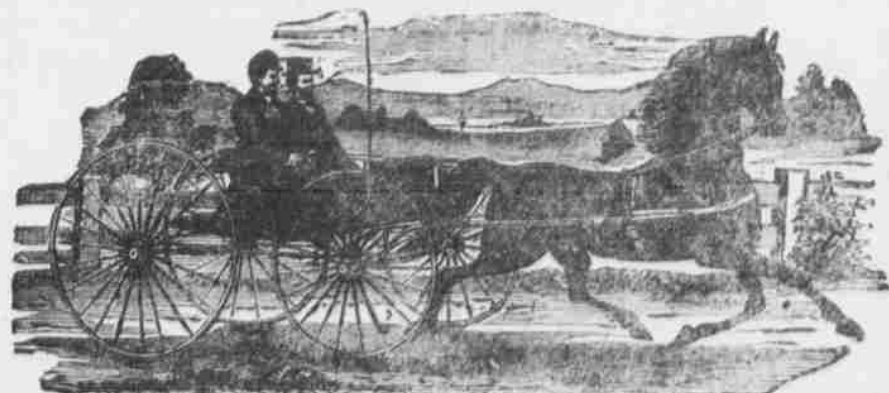
